

HBCU students organize thousands for protest in Jackson

On Saturday June 6, Jackson, MS joined the many cities across the nation whose streets were flooded with peaceful protesters. They protested in remembrance of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery and unnumbered other black and brown people who died at the hand of police.

A powerful showing
The march, which is reported to have included more than 4,500 participants from across the state and beyond, was held at 3p.m., spanning more than 6 blocks in downtown Jackson. It began at the governor’s mansion, making its way to the capitol building, passing other government institutions, before returning to the

governor’s mansion.
The march was organized by HBCU students Calvert White of Alcorn State University, Taylor Turnage of Tougaloo College, Maisie Brown of North Carolina A&T, and Timothy Young, a recent graduate of Jackson State University. The organized protest was a collaboration between the MS NAACP Youth & College Division and Mississippi Black Lives Matter (BLM), as well as other social justice organizations.
This started out as a group chat... It just took off from there,” said Turnage, who serves as the state president of the NAACP Youth & College Division. “We expected 500 at the most...It’s amazing how fast word can spread with just one

click of a button.”
Cognizant of the prevailing national issues of COVID-19 and violence associated with protestors, the student organizers required all participants to wear masks and remain peaceful. “There are two pandemics going on right now; one has been going on four hundreds years longer than the other,” said Turnage.
The event carried a spectacular ambiance. African drums played, rhythmically ushering protesters along their path. There were several featured speakers, including the student organizers, whose words stirred the hearts of participants in remembrance of the many black lives lost unjustly.
Singer Avery Neyland delivered a chilling rendition of the black national anthem, “Lift Ev-

ery Voice and Sing.” Young lead an eight-minute-forty-second long silence, in remembrance of the amount of time Floyd was brutally knelt upon by officer Derek Chauvin.
“Saturday showed that times are changing,” said Turnage. “Most people... have been waiting on something like this.”
Starting at home
The young organizers included with their protest a list of demands for government officials and a call to action for community members. “You can’t try to change the country...[and] world, until you start at home, in your community,” said Turnage.
Among other things, organizers demanded that elected offi-

Neighbors unite in silent protest of Floyd’s killing

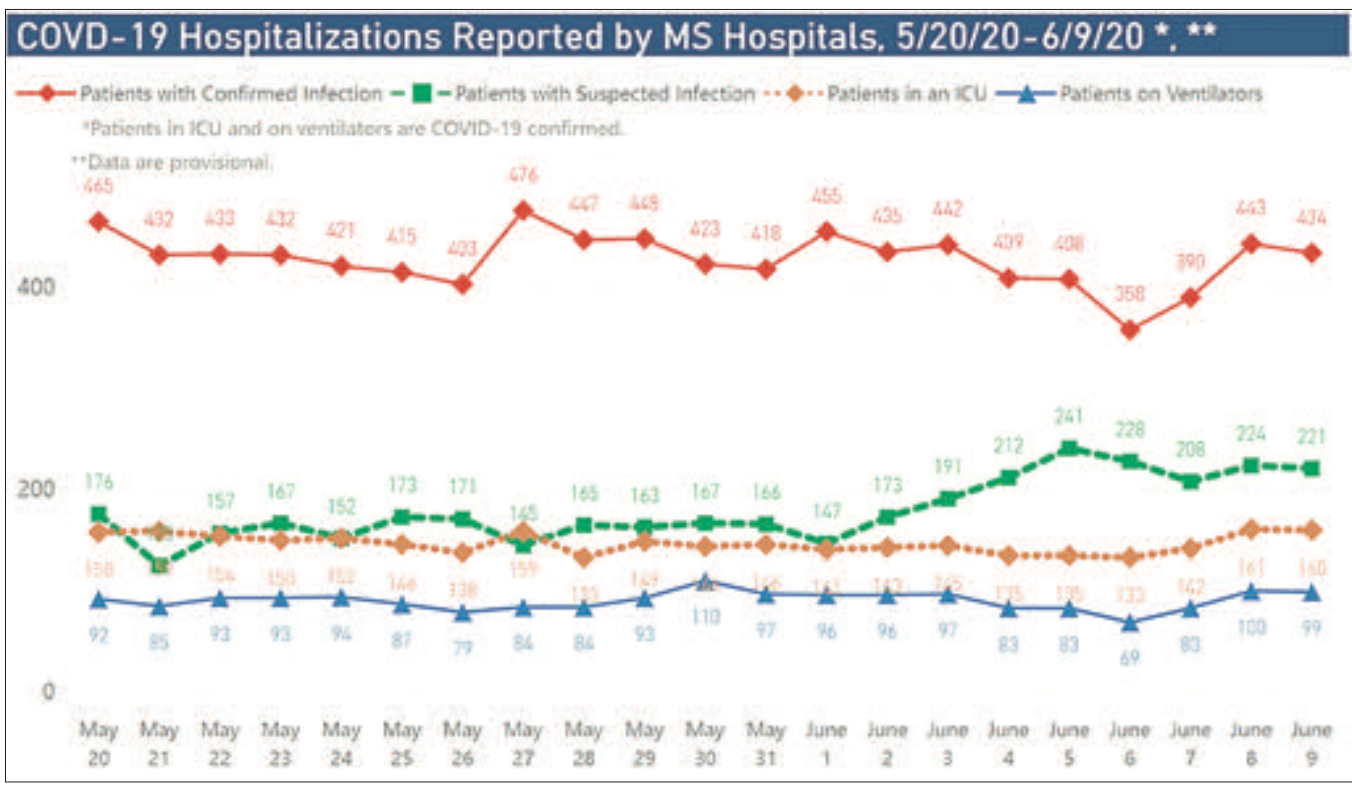
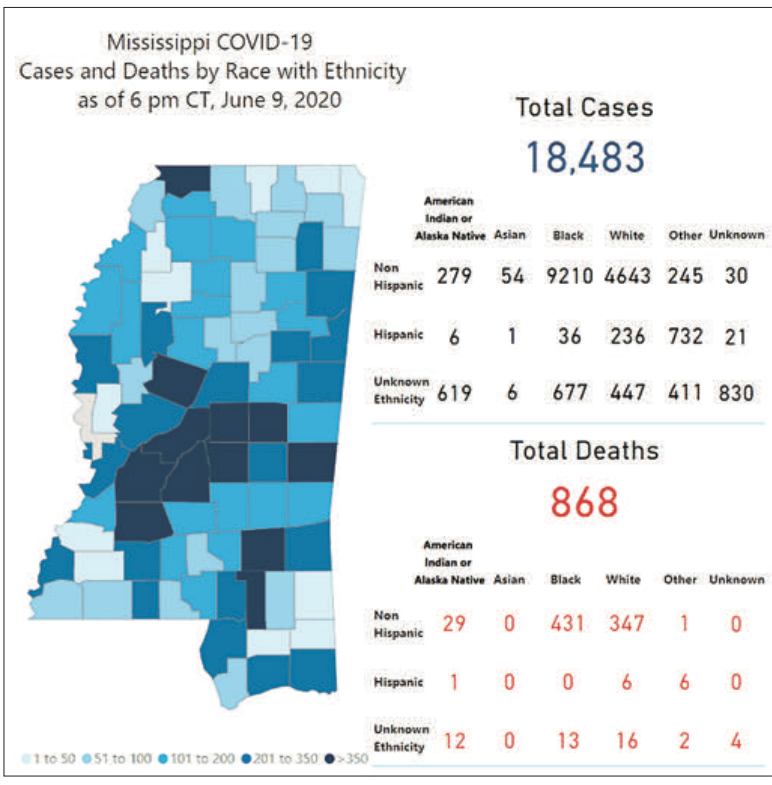

While streets were packed on Saturday with protest marchers in downtown Jackson, as well as across the state, the nation and throughout the world, a silent protest was held in Northeast Jackson by neighbors in the North Meadows Neighborhood Association. Individual participants were filled with outrage over the gruesome killing of George Floyd by fired police officer Derek Chauvin, May 25. Neighbors came out of


their homes to unite by kneeling, sitting, or standing for approximately ten minutes in silence.
John Garner, Tougaloo College retired physics professor, said it was the idea of his wife Margrit to have a silent protest. The Garners, who are white, moved into the North Meadows neighborhood at a time when whites were moving out because blacks were moving in. Garner said it was financially a

Support grows to take confederate emblem off Mississippi state flag

There is a movement happening right now in our nation. The world is outraged after watching a video of another unarmed black man being murdered by yet another white police officer. It reminds us all too well of the story of 14 year-old Emmett Till.

At the well-attended protest organized by college students this past weekend in Jackson in support of justice for George Floyd and the Black Lives Matter Movement, protestors chanted, “Change the flag! Change the flag!”

Mississippi is the only state that still bears the Confederate emblem in the canon of the state flag. The current flag, adopted in 1894 by an all white legislature, should be changed to a symbol that represents all Mississippians. The canon of the state flag is the same Confederate emblem used during the Civil War by Robert E. Lee’s Army of Northern Virginia which over time has come to represent the Confederate States of America. It is the same symbol used by the Ku Klux Klan, a white supremacist hate group, to terrorize African Americans for decades.

In 1861, in the Mississippi Articles of Secession, Mississippi stated their position boldly and clearly, “Our position is thoroughly identified with the institution of slavery – the greatest material interest of the world.”

Why are white southerners still holding onto this symbol? The South lost the Civil War. Why has the south continued to celebrate a war they lost and claim it as their heritage – a heritage of hate.

The current Mississippi state flag not only represents treason and tyranny, but it is a symbol of white supremacy, slavery and oppression. Any sound thinking, fair individual would say it’s time for a change.

A bipartisan group, composed of Democrats and Republicans, are drafting a resolution to take the Confederate battle emblem off the state’s flag. Organizers have been rallying, marching and protesting for the last five years for them to change the state flag, and finally lawmakers are listening.

“The people of Mississippi made a decision in 2001, an overwhelming decision to maintain the flag,” Governor Tate Reeves responded in a televised interview. “My position has not changed. I believe there is going to come a time at some point I’m sure, when the people of Mississippi are going to want to change the flag. My position is, when they want to do that, it should be the people that make that decision, not some backroom deal by a bunch of politicians in Jackson.”

“Mississippi was at your door yesterday Mrs. Reeves. I’m not sure if you were there, but I know you heard it,” actress and activist Aunjanue Ellis said in a video posted on twitter. In the six minute and forty one seconds lengthy video, the actress addressed the wife of Governor Reeves, Elee Reeves. “How would you feel if that was a white child? George Floyd wasn’t the first. Arnell Ponder was beaten by police in Mississippi. June Johnson was beaten by police in Mississippi. Fannie Lou Hamer was brutalized and sexually assaulted by police officers in a Winona jail...The reality is that flag has been at the sight of

church burnings, church bombings, assassinations and shootings.” In the video, Ellis asks Mrs. Reeves to whisper to her husband to do the right thing and take down the current state flag and be the governor that Medgar Evers, James Meredith and Emmett Till deserved and be the first governor of the people.”

Senator John Horhn said a referendum is not necessary. “The Governor can change the flag tomorrow if he wanted to. The legislature can change the flag tomorrow if it wanted to,” Horhn explained. “There are a lot of legislators that want to see this thing changed, but the leadership is afraid.”

“All we would have to do is have two-thirds of our body agree to do the suspension of the rules,” Horhn said. “If Reeves won’t change it, Horhn said a referendum could be on the ballot this year, but the legislature would have to suspend rules that make bills subject to deadline.”

Elected officials who choose to stay silent on this issue are cowards,” said Jarrius Adams, a 22-year-old activist who co-organized Saturday’s Black Lives Matter protest in Jackson. “The history and heritage it symbolizes isn’t welcoming or inclusive for black folks. Our elected officials have a responsibility to ensure anything that represents our state represents us equitably.”

In Memoriam Doris Marie Terry Bingham

February 28, 1931 – June 5, 2020

Doris Marie Terry Bingham was born February 28, 1931 in Terry, Mississippi. She was one of four children born to the late Allen Terry and Gussie Ford Terry. Her sister Clara M. Bingham and infant brother Lennell Terry preceded her in death.

Doris’ early Christian training began at home and was reinforced at Terry Mission Baptist Church (TMBC).

She married her childhood sweetheart, James Bingham Jr., in September of 1951, who preceded her in death in 2009. They worshiped at TMBC and various churches in the greater Jackson area.

Doris embraced the importance of multiple streams of income at an early age. She received her certification in cosmetology from the Davis School of Beauty and Culture and helped to open a beauty shop in the early 1950s. She worked at that shop for 15 years before moving to her home-based shop. During that time, Doris began her 25-year career in food service with Jackson Public Schools (JPS).

Not long after starting at JPS she also began styling hair at Cook Funeral Home. After 25 years at Cook, she went to Westhaven Funeral Home as their hair stylist. Doris put down her curling irons and styling combs at the young age of 82 after 43 years of funeral home service and over 60 years of total styling service.

Doris was concerned about her community. She took great pride in the beauty of her yard and in the appearance of her neighbors’ yards evidenced by her cutting their lawns if their grass got to tall.

Remaining to cherish her legacy are three children: Barnessa L. Cook (Earnest) of Terry, MS,



Paulette D. Bingham-Daniel of Indianapolis, IN and Bruce W. Bingham (Daneen) of Woolwich Township, NJ; seven grandchildren: Earnest Cook IV (Diana), Russell G. Cook (Heather), Tovia M Allen, Twannette S. Harrington, Cedric D. Cook, Brittney N. Bingham and Bria S. Bingham; eight great grandchildren; one sister: Margie Reeves Smith of Terry, MS; two brothers-in-law: Eugene “Nibby” Bingham and Louis “Wanky” Bingham of Indianapolis, IN; three sisters-in-law: Nora Staples of Raymond, MS, Victoria Bingham and Pearline Bingham of Jackson, MS and numerous nieces, nephews, cousins, and friends.

Memorial service will be held Saturday, June 13, 2020, 1 p.m., at Rosemont Garden Memorial Park, Jackson, MS.

very good for them, because back then, the value of the property was going down because blacks were moving in. He and his wife, who have been on the side of civil rights for a lifetime, never considered moving out of the neighborhood which is now about 90% black.

Mary Smith, who is president of the neighborhood association thought it was a great idea to have the protest. She had a poster in front of her with hand-written names of 43 individuals and another with Black Lives Matter. When asked why she was participating in the protest she stated, “I am participating in this peaceful sit-out in honor of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor and others that have died as a result of police brutality.” She said the names on the poster include people from various communities and states that the world will never know about.

Christine Armstrong said, “This sitting-out protest is about our neighborhood fighting together for the same cause,” which she said was getting justice for Floyd.

Katie Williams, who was sitting out with her son

Ben, said, I’m sitting out today for this peaceful sit-in but during the civil rights movement of the 60’s I marched with Dr. Martin Luther King and Medgar Evers.” Williams, who is originally from Benton, MS in Yazoo County, said, “During that time I had hoses sprayed on me and dogs sicced on me.” She said she was sitting out because unjust treatment for blacks is still going on.

Jimmy Coins joined his neighbor Lena Terry for the sit-out. Coins said “it is a privilege to be a part of this protest, having grown up in the 80’s. My generation didn’t have the opportunity to take part in the civil rights era.”

Terry, who was proud of her poster regarding the protest said she is originally from a small MS town called Itta Bena. “I participated in the civil rights protests of the 60’s where people were beaten and taken to jail just for participating.” She recalled marching all the way from Tougaloo, MS to the state capital in Jackson where protesters were asked to sleep on the grass of the Tougaloo College campus on the night before the march. She said, “It was

so hot during those summer days but we didn’t give up.”

Irma Armstrong, who just received a master’s degree in sociology from Jackson State University, said she was happy to participate in the peaceful demonstration for Floyd. She said, “It takes strong people and mild people working together to affect change.”

Garner, who had slowly knelt down on his knees at 6 p.m., was very pleased that his community took part in the protest. He said, “The kneeling for 9 minutes gave me a new understanding.” He said it wasn’t that easy to kneel for such a long time, not to mention how the officer could have kept his knee on Floyd’s neck with hand in his pocket for all that time. He agrees with various outspoken leaders that community policing would be a better long-time solution for the future.

Garner, who spent 30 years at Tougaloo College where he helped start the physics department, has lived in this northeast community for 28 years. He and his wife have a long history of activism. He is very proud of the work his wife does with the com-

munity and recalls his mother-in-law once telling him, “Margrit is a woman of ‘grit, and he agrees with her.

He said Margrit spends many hours during the day helping the homeless by getting them food, shelter and medical care. Be it under a bridge on I-55 or in a motel where they may not have food, Margrit does what she can to help on a daily basis. No matter where she meets them she always asks, “May I enter your home?”

One neighbor described Margrit as a busy body that every community needs. As for Margrit, she says her best teacher for the work she does was Civil Rights activist Medgar Evers, who said to her while they were working together: “I visualize a city in which people realize God makes no junk, and all our blood is the same; so we must all work together.”

The North Meadows neighborhood is located east of Manhattan Drive and on the south side of Cedars of Lebanon Road in Jackson, MS.

sign in light of insensitive comments that he made towards Floyd.

Of the community, the young organizers required continued and increased support. They called for community members to hold elected officials accountable, to be active voters, and to support the Mississippi BLM Bail Fund, which supports protesters who are arrested for their activism.

Notably, the organizers declined personal protective equipment (PPE) support from Governor Tate Reeves on Twitter Friday, the day before the protest. “[I] asked MEMA to get COVID-19 masks together for anybody who needs one,” said the governor on Twitter. “Highway Patrol will get them to protestors. Stay safe and God bless!”

The organizers responded tersely, “Mr. Governor [...] This ain’t that. We got it, thanks.” “We [saw it] as Tate Reeves making another effort to police protests,” said Turnage. “The comment on Twitter was in no way to disrespect anyone.”

They expressed that they wanted to maintain the peace themselves, rather than through government policing. “It was peaceful because we wanted it to be,” said White. They also said that they already had collected enough PPE through donations by the time the governor had offered.

Nevertheless, the Highway Patrol did show up, distributing water to protestors in the heat. To the satisfaction of the student organizers, they mostly remained behind the fences of the governor’s mansion, according to Turnage.

A larger discussion

The BLM Movement is renowned for its place in the social media age, in which protests can be engaged not only in the streets, but also on many devices. “Saturday would not have turned out how it did if it was not for technology,” said Turnage.

Yet, with protests against police brutality and advocacy for institutional reforms becoming rapidly common across all races and classes, some worry that the trend has become a fad. “We do this everyday,” said Turnage. “We’re honestly the last people [who] care about clout.”

When asked about how young people can best support the cause, White said, “The most effective form of protest ... is self-education.”

White and Turnage also spoke on the inclusivity of recent protests. They said that non-black and brown people should be cognizant of their roles as allies. “In your efforts to stand beside us, make sure that you don’t drown us out when we have something to say,” said Turnage. “This is a space that, for the first time, was...not created with you in mind,” said White.

“People tend to get equality and equity mixed up,” Turnage said. “Equality is when everyone is given the same thing...[but equity] is where everyone is given what they need based upon what they lack... America is so messed up from hundreds of years [of injustice]... We can’t survive [with just] equality.”

Beyond the protest, the organizers emphasized

the importance of voting. “We need to start building our young people up, teaching them about government and politics,” said Turnage. “The problem is not that our vote is useless, [it’s] that people are only voting on the president.”

In the 2016 presidential election, Donald Trump won, not by popular vote but, by rule of the electoral college. Turnage pointed to this instance as a harm to Americans’ trust in the value of their votes.

“We say that we’re a democracy, but in a democracy, the popular vote wins.” She advocated for an end to the electoral college, saying, “... [it] was [originally] used to suppress the votes of poor whites...[Now] it’s expanded to every minority... throughout this country.”

The work goes on...

The students who gathered thousands to the state capitol for the most historic protest since the 1960s said that the work has only just begun. “We have not stopped, the work has not stopped... we took a half day off.”

Every like or retweet, word of support and showing of solidarity lends a helping hand to the cause of the young Mississippians in search of a brighter, more just future for all. However, as White distinguished, “The most effective form of protest ... is self-education... No one is going to do it for you.”

MLBC gathers superintendents to achieve equitable education amid COVID-19

Mississippi educators, including many superintendents, and members of the Mississippi Department of Education (MDE), joined to hear a panel of the state's premier educators, convened by Senator Angela Turner-Ford, chair of the Mississippi Legislative Black Caucus (MLBC). The meeting was held virtually through video call, as a caveat of the COVID-19 pandemic. Educational consultant Phelton "Cortez" Moss acted as moderator. He mentioned the billions of dollars lost to COVID-19 complications, also claiming many teacher's jobs. Facing common struggles and striving toward the common goal of a successful fall, the panelists engaged in discussion about how to provide a good school experience amid COVID-19. Many shared their experiences in dealing with the COVID-19 coronavirus outbreak in its initial stages. Meridian superintendent Amy Carter shared that she prioritized student meals and access to books at home. She also had teachers simply contact parents to check on students, without mention of any schoolwork. "[We were] trying to make sure that our families knew... that we were there for them." Hazlehurst superintendent Cloyd Garth noted the importance of engaging in difficult but honest conversations. "We have to figure this out together," he said. Many expressed concerns for social distancing in a school environment. Bus seating will have to be drastically limited. How will routes be changed, and how will that affect tardiness policies? Will classrooms have to rotate teachers, instead of students? Greenville superintendent Debra Dace suggested that federal CARES funds could be utilized to help

meet some of these needs. "The new normal is thinking outside the box," she said. The panel also discussed difficulties in licensing new teachers. In his efforts to gain and retain teachers, McComb superintendent Cederick Ellis said that his district is taking advantage of certificate waivers from MDE for certification. He said he plans to certify as many teachers as he can by December 2021. "It's invaluable, the difference that National Board certification makes on a teacher's life," said professional educator Kelly Riley. Difficulties of online learning were also discussed. Noting difficulties on the part of teachers and students alike, West Bolivar Superintendent John Taylor said, "It forces us to have to collaborate." Ellis expressed the importance of giving parents options. "We're using our summer program to... [simulate] what we're going to be doing in the fall," shared Dace about her strategy. Panelists voiced that there are various challenges in achieving equity in schooling. "[Social and emotional needs] always [were]... huge, and even more so now," said Jackson Superintendent Errick Green. Several educators spoke emphatically about the value of Pre-K education, as an agent of equity, providing a more level starting point for all students. Greene shared about the Strong Start program, which he said is set to offer "high quality Pre-K" to about two thirds of pre-k aged scholars in Jackson. "It's a mindset of the parents and the students," said Carter, noting that her district's third graders who attended pre-k and kindergarten do better statistically. Attendance revisions were also an item of much interest. Currently, public

schools are funded based upon attendance, so if parents are afraid to send their students to school because of COVID-19, school districts will suffer financially. Multiple panelists voiced that a change from funding schools based on attendance to funding them based on membership would be a welcomed solution to this problem and a step towards more equitable schooling. In light of the many variables involved with returning to school successfully in the fall, many educators simply voiced a need for directions from the MDE. "Just give us some type of guidance," said Dace. Panelists also discussed the possibility of downsizing their school district, especially as a reality of the budget constraints brought about by COVID-19. Taylor noted that his district had experienced some recent successes through downsizing. Prominent benefits of this method were that more students could be taught by the best teachers, and costs can be reduced by closing campuses. However, despite the surface benefits, downsizing comes with many potential hazards. In addition to unrest from parents who will have to adjust to such things as transferring schools, it is difficult to decide what educational roles are expendable. "There are so many unknowns... It's really hard to pinpoint," said Dace. As the MLBC conference on education amid COVID-19 concluded, there were many concerns raised, but reaching solutions was proven a difficult task. Yet, the gathering was far from a loss, because it solidified a growing consensus amongst state leaders in education. In the words of Garth, "We have to figure this out together." Moss assured the attendees, "this conversation will continue."

Proverbs 21:5 says, “When justice is done, it is a joy to the righteous but terror to evildoers.” Isaiah 30:18 reminds us that God is a “God of Justice.” Micah 6:8 says, “He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?” Proverbs 22:8 says, “Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity, and the rod of his fury will fail.” Depending on the version you use, there are between 28 (King James) and 167 (New Living references to justice in the Bible. Analysis: Protesters talked, first-year lawmaker listened

Democratic state Rep. Zakiya Summers of Jackson has been in the Mississippi House only since January. She stepped into a leadership role Friday when protesters were demanding to enter the state Capitol and were being blocked by police officers who stood in front of a locked door.

The protesters wanted any elected official – the governor, the attorney general, any available legislator – to listen to their grievances about police brutality against African Americans.

Summers was the only lawmaker to be found inside the Capitol on an afternoon that the House and Senate were not meeting. At the request of Capitol police, she stepped outside to speak to the crowd of about 200.

Summers made an immediate connection, letting protesters know she was listening to their concerns.

“I want the same thing y’all want – no free killing,” Summers said.

One of the protesters held a megaphone to amplify the freshman lawmaker’s voice. Summers said that as a black woman, she worries about the possibility of police brutality against her three sons, her husband or her father.

“Yes, ma’am,” one of the protesters responded. “Come on with it,” said another.

“It’s time out for the foolishness,” Summers said. “And it’s time out for people being in positions and using their position and using their privilege and using their whiteness to continue to oppress our people.”

The protesters had already been to the Sillers State Office Building across the street from the Capitol, where they were turned away when a police officer told

them the building was closed because of the coronavirus pandemic. They wanted to deliver a letter to Republican Attorney General Lynn Fitch, criticizing her decision to drop the prosecution of a white former police officer, Canyon Boykin, in the 2015 shooting death of an African-American man, Ricky Ball, after a traffic stop.

Fitch’s predecessor, Democrat Jim Hood, persuaded a grand jury to indict Boykin in 2016 on a manslaughter charge. Boykin pleaded not guilty and was awaiting trial. After Fitch took office in January, she had her staff review the case, and she announced May 28 that she was dropping the charge after concluding the evidence showed Boykin acted in self-defense. The case was dropped “with prejudice,” meaning it can’t be refiled.

The Mississippi Poor People’s Campaign organized the Friday protest and wrote the letter to Fitch. Summers promised she would deliver copies to every lawmaker. Her voice also choked with emotion as she stood with Ball’s young daughter and told the crowd that “systemic racism is real.”

“This is not a moment. This is a movement,” Summers said. “My

heart is filled. What a time to be a legislator, right? What a time to be in a position where you can create the change that you want to see.”

During a news conference Thursday, Summers had stood with other members of the Mississippi Legislative Black Caucus in the Capitol rotunda. They said they hope national protests about police treatment of African Americans will focus attention on some changes they have sought for years.

Democratic Rep. John Faulkner of Holly Springs said the proposals include the mandated use of body cameras by law enforcement officers and the appointment of special prosecutors in cases of officer-involved shootings.

Faulkner said caucus members have also sought to require “racial impact statements” for all pieces of legislation, evaluating how proposed laws might affect African Americans.

And they have pushed for automatic restoration of voting rights when a person completes a sentence for a disenfranchising felony. Mississippi’s current system disproportionately hurts African Americans. Legislators must vote to restore suffrage on a person-by-person basis, and only a few of those requests are granted each year.

Summers’ action of listening to the protesters helped diffuse tension Friday. Summers also praised the Capitol police, who had stood stoically while several protesters yelled in their faces.

“I love our security because they’re doing their job,” said Summers, who was flanked by several officers.

As Summers spoke, a Capitol policewoman stood with her arm protectively around the lawmaker’s back.

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar – It’s important for athletes to speak out in wake of Floyd protests

Los Angeles Lakers legend Kareem Abdul-Jabbar is no stranger to social activism and protests. Jabbar, the all-time leading scorer in NBA history who earned six world titles, boycotted the 1968 Olympics in the wake of social unrest and the aftermath of the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. In a live interview with the BlackPressUSA, Jabbar said he believes the murder of George Floyd by police and the subsequent protests around the globe, signal a sea change. “Across America, people of all descriptions got an understanding of

what it means to be a black American, to be singled out and discriminated against,” Jabbar said during the interview, co-hosted by Brandon Brooks, managing Editor of the *Los Angeles Sentinel*. “For so many black Americans, it’s just a daily grind of possible bad situations that you come across just because of the color of your skin. Jabbar commended his fellow athletes for their history of activism, including LeBron James, who has spoken out about Floyd’s murder. “It is really important for athletes, especially those in African-American communities and communities of color, to speak out because the young people in those communities look up to athletes as the people that set the tone and have the knowledge and courage to do what is right,” Jabbar insisted. “They look upon athletes in a way that is just a little bit less than how they look at their own parents. So, athletes are very important to the hopes and dreams of young people in those communities.”

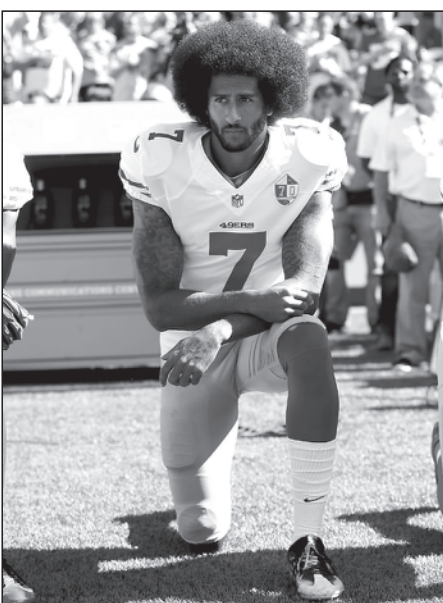

Colin Kaepernick has more support now, still long way to go

When Colin Kaepernick took a knee during the national anthem to take a stand against police brutality and racial injustice in 2016, he was mostly alone. Politicians, team owners and fellow players criticized him, fans burned his jersey, and he was booed even at home. Four years later, his protest is widely viewed as prescient. Global opinion has shifted so much that more people are now vilifying those who attack Kaepernick or misrepresent his stance. New Orleans Saints star quarterback Drew Brees issued a public apologize Thursday after he was excoriated by teammates, other athletes and fans for saying he “will never agree with anybody disrespecting the flag of the United States.” That sentiment has been voiced loudly by Kaepernick’s critics and President Donald Trump reiterated it Friday, saying on Twitter: “I am a big fan of Drew Brees. I think he’s truly one of the greatest quarterbacks, but he should not have taken back his original stance on honoring our magnificent American Flag. OLD GLORY is to be revered, cherished and flown high... We should be standing up straight and tall, ideally with a salute, or a hand on heart. There are other things you can protest, but not our Great American Flag – no kneeling.” Still, George Floyd’s death, which ignited nationwide protests over racial injustice and police brutality, awakened many people to the root of the issues that led to Kaepernick’s peaceful demonstration – an expression meant to raise awareness of such issues, not demean the flag or the anthem. The 32-year-old Kaepernick hasn’t played in the NFL since 2016. “The protest is really trying to hold us accountable for the things we say we believe in. It’s about equality and justice for all,” said Houston Texans wide receiver Kenny Stills, who has been taking a knee during Week 1 of the 2016 season. This week, San Francisco 49ers coach Kyle Shanahan said Kaepernick deserves respect and admiration for starting the protest. Seattle Seahawks coach Pete Carroll praised him for his courage and sacrificing his career. Hall of Fame coach Tony Dungy compared Kaepernick to Muhammad Ali. “There’s a lot of parallels between Colin and my father,” said Ali’s daughter, Khaliyah. “He stands 100 percent with integrity no matter the cost. He made an unwavering commitment for the betterment of his people and took an unapologetic stance against injustice. I have had many people attempt to discourage our support of Colin, which is unthinkable to me. He is a friend to our family, he is loved and honored.” Jacob Ali-Wertheimer, the 21-year-old grandson of the boxing legend, is a human and civil rights leader on Harvard University’s campus. He is encouraged because more folks support Kaepernick’s movement but realizes there’s a long way to go. “A lot of people don’t want to address race in this country. We don’t have a real dialogue on the issue,” Ali-Wertheimer said. “It’s something we try to hide and push away, and because we don’t confront it, I think that’s why both of them were ostracized in the beginning, and I think it’s wonderful that people are coming along now to what Colin said. “But we need to get to a point where people can understand and listen and appreciate his message from the beginning moving forward.” The NFL and its teams have voiced their support for equality and called for change. Players want to see more. In a video released Thursday night, 2018 NFL MVP Patrick Mahomes and several of his peers asked the league to “condemn racism and the systemic oppression of black people” and “admit wrong in silencing players from peacefully protesting.” The league issued a statement prior to

the video saying: “We stand with the black community because black lives matter. Through Inspire Change, the NFL, players and our partners have supported programs and initiatives throughout the country to address systemic racism. We will continue using our platform to challenge the injustice around us.” Shanahan, who became coach of the 49ers after Kaepernick’s last season with the team, had strong words on the topic. “I think people understand it so much more now than they did three years ago and I’m all for protests. I’m all for change,” Shanahan said. “What’s different now and then, it’s embarrassing to say, probably, but I think white people are more passionate about it now than then. That’s our ignorance and that’s what upsets black people. They have every right to be upset because they haven’t just been telling us this the last few weeks. They’ve been telling us this since our grandparents, and I’ve been hearing it from every one of my friends since I was 14. Then I hear Champ Bailey talking about it in his Hall of Fame speech. It’s all the time and it’s too long. Whatever’s got to get changed, let’s do it.” Chicago Bears linebacker Danny Trevathan said the global pandemic has given people more time to think about race issues. “Back then it was just made about one situation, about the military, and that’s what everybody was focusing on,” Trevathan said. “I’ve got people in my family that fought for America in the military, different branches. So it wasn’t about that. It was about something bigger than that issue. It was about police brutality and the way we treat people. Right now, I feel like we are taking a different stand because people are sick of it.” Kaepernick still wants an opportunity to play. A workout in Atlanta last November that was organized by the NFL turned chaotic and resulted in no job offers. “Colin is a talented football player,” Seahawks star Russell Wilson said this week. “I remember playing against him; the man could play some football. But he stood up for something far more greater than football. And that’s people’s lives. He was standing up for people that have come and gone and for everyone who is African-American and the oppression that has been going on.” Stills, former Carolina Panthers safety Eric Reid and Miami Dolphins wideout Albert Wilson continued supporting Kaepernick’s fight by taking a knee during the anthem last season. “The boos in the stadium, people yelling to stand up, telling me to leave the country, death threats, hate mail, hate on social media was alarming,” Stills says about the pushback he has faced. “Still can’t understand the amount of hatred toward somebody basically asking everyone to feel compassionate about others.” AP Pro Football Writer Josh Dubow and AP Sports Writers Tim Booth and Steve Megargee contributed to this report.

LEGAL

ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A TEMPORARY CITYWIDE LEISURE AND RECREATION DISTRICT WITHIN THE CORPORATE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI AND DESIGNATE THE GEOGRAPHIC AREAS INCLUDED WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF SAID DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, the City of Jackson, Mississippi (the "City"), is a municipal corporation, organized and existing according to the laws of the State of Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, during the 2016 Legislative Session, the Mississippi Legislature enacted House Bill 1223, effective July 1, 2016, and codified in Miss. Code Ann. § 67-1-101, which permits and authorizes certain municipalities in the State of Mississippi to establish "Leisure and Recreation Districts" and to designate the geographic areas to be included within the district; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2612, signed and effective July 1, 2017, added additional cities and expanded area within the City of Jackson; and

WHEREAS, during the 2018 Legislative Session, the Mississippi Legislature enacted Senate Bill 2588, effective July 1, 2018, which amended Miss. Code Ann. § 67-1-101 by providing that "the governing authorities of a municipality, by ordinance, may establish one or more leisure and recreation districts within the corporate boundaries of the municipality and designate the geographic area or areas to be included within a district. The governing authorities of a municipality, by ordinance, may modify the boundaries of a leisure and recreation district. In addition, the boundaries of a leisure and recreation district may extend from within the municipality into the unincorporated area of the county in which the municipality is located if the county consents to the extension and has voted in favor of coming out from under the dry law."; and

WHEREAS, Miss. Code Ann. § 67-1-101 requires that an Ordinance which establishes a Leisure and Recreation District include a detailed description of the area or areas within the district, the boundaries of the district, and a georeferenced map of the district, as well as a description of the manner in which the municipality will provide for adequate law enforcement and other public safety measures and services within the district; and

WHEREAS, municipalities which create Leisure and Recreation Districts authorize business entities that hold alcoholic beverage permits issued by the Department of Revenue, and that are located within the boundaries of the designated Leisure and Recreation District, to allow patrons to leave the licensed premises with an open container of alcohol and to carry and consume alcoholic beverages within the designated Leisure and Recreation District; and

WHEREAS, the restaurants and bars in the city are vibrant and diverse providing unique dining experiences for the citizens of the city; and

WHEREAS, the restaurants and bars in the city are vital contributors to the city's economic and financial success, generating sales and tourism taxes; and

WHEREAS, the Coronavirus outbreak and the necessary measures taken by local and state government to curb the spread of the virus have caused restaurants and bars to experience substantial economic loss; and

WHEREAS, the Alcoholic Beverage Commission ("ABC") has relaxed its regulations on both package retailer permittees (liquor stores) and on premise retail alcoholic beverage permittees in order to maintain sustainability in these business sectors during the Coronavirus outbreak, including phone-in transactions, curbside delivery and "doggie bag" unopened bottles of wine at restaurants (as opposed to the previously allowed re-orked dinein option) with the carry out/drive-through/curbside pick-up of a meal; and

WHEREAS, the ABC now allows mixed drink liquor and wine to be sold with carry out/ curbside/drive-through pick up of meals in established Leisure and Recreation Districts of this State; and

WHEREAS, the city's restaurants and bars holding an on premise retail alcoholic beverage permits are located throughout the city, not just in the existing Leisure and Recreation Districts; and

WHEREAS, the creation of a temporary city wide leisure and recreation district constitutes an emergency measure and is reasonable and necessary for the sustainability and future viability of the business sector, and the expansion of same is in the best interest of the public peace, health and safety of the citizens of Jackson; and

WHEREAS, the governing authorities of the City have further determined that the establishment of a temporary city wide Leisure and Recreation District would be in the best interests of the City; and

WHEREAS, the governing authorities of the City have found and determined that the manner of current law enforcement is adequate and sufficient for the area to be designated as a Leisure and Recreation District, and the Mayor has agreed to direct that the Jackson Police Department continue to provide adequate and sufficient law enforcement and other public safety measures and services as stated herein in the City's Leisure and Recreation District established pursuant to this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, nothing herein is intended to confer any rights or entitlement as the sale of alcohol within an area designated as a Leisure and Recreation District is a privilege and not a right and is subject at all times to reasonable regulation; and

WHEREAS, subject to Miss. Code Ann. § 67-1-101 and this Ordinance, the City hereby establishes a Temporary Citywide Leisure and Recreation District as more fully set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF FINDINGS: The matters, facts and things recited in the above and foregoing Preamble to this Ordinance be, and they are hereby adopted as the official findings of the governing authorities of the City.

SECTION 2. TITLE: This ordinance shall be known as ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A TEMPORARY CITYWIDE LEISURE AND RECREATION DISTRICT.

SECTION 3. CREATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF DISTRICT: Under the authority granted in Miss. Code Ann. § 67-1-101, the City does hereby establish a Temporary Citywide Leisure and Recreation District, within the geographic areas and within such boundaries as are set forth and designated herein and as represented on the geo-referenced map which is incorporated herein and attached hereto as Exhibit 1. The Leisure and Recreation District established herein shall be known as the "Temporary Citywide Leisure and Recreation District" (the "District") and shall have the boundaries incorporated herein and attached hereto as Exhibit 2.

SECTION 4. OUTSIDE CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES PERMITTED; CONDITIONS: Any on-premises retail alcoholic beverage restaurant/bar permittee (a "permittee") of the eligible establishments located within the District shall comply with all laws, rules and regulations which govern its license type, except that a patron, guest or member of that permittee may remove an uncovered container of alcoholic beverage, beer or wine from the licensed premises, and may possess and consume such beverage outside of the licensed premises anywhere within the boundaries of the District subject to the following regulations:

- Nothing in this Ordinance permits a patron to possess or consume an alcoholic beverage, beer or wine in an uncovered container that was not purchased from an on-premises retail alcoholic beverage permittee located within the District.

- A person may not enter licensed premises with a covered or uncovered container of alcoholic beverage, beer or wine acquired outside the District.

- A permittee located in the District shall allow alcoholic beverages to be removed from the licensed premises only in containers possessing the insignia or indicia of a permittee.

- No permittee shall allow a patron, guest or member to exit its licensed premises with more than one uncovered container per entrée purchased of an alcoholic beverage, and it shall be unlawful for any person to exit such licensed premises with more than one such uncovered container per entrée sold. Permittees located in the District may allow alcoholic beverages to be removed from the licensed premises every Monday from 10:00 a.m. through Sunday at 9:59 p.m.

- Nothing in this Ordinance shall require a permittee located in the District to allow its patrons to remove alcoholic beverages in uncovered containers from the licensed premises.

- Permittees located in the District shall post, at all points of egress from the licensed premises, a map of the boundaries of the District in which it is located, as delineated in Exhibit 1. Permittees must also post the temporary guidelines as delineated in Exhibit 3. The map and guidelines shall be provided, either in electronic or paper form, to those permittees upon their request.

- All mixed drink liquor, beer, wines, and alcohol provided curbside or drive-thru to an individual operating a motorized vehicle shall be served in a covered container with no straw.

- The objective of this Ordinance is primarily to allow pedestrians to carry uncovered containers of alcoholic beverages. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to allow patrons, guests, or members of a permittee to drive a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle while carrying an uncovered container of alcoholic beverage onto or into such vehicle. It shall be a violation of this Ordinance for any person to drive a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle while carrying an uncovered container, containing an alcoholic beverage within the District in which it was purchased. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to allow patrons, guests or members of a permittee to leave the District as a pedestrian or passenger in a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle of any kind while carrying an uncovered container of an alcoholic beverage.

- Each permittee shall be required to place trash receptacles at an exit and entrance door of the licensed premises.

- Guidelines for this temporary citywide leisure and recreation district are attached as Exhibit 3.

SECTION 5. OUTSIDE CONSUMPTION OF BEER AND LIGHT WINE PERMITTED; CONDITIONS: Within the boundaries of the District, a permittee may also allow beer and

light wine to be removed from the licensed premises subject to the same regulations as Alcoholic Beverages and Wine.

SECTION 6. DEFINITION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES: For the purposes of this Ordinance, the term "alcoholic beverages" shall mean any alcoholic liquid, including wines of more than five percent (5%) of alcohol by weight, capable of being consumed as a beverage by a human being, including native wines. Within the boundaries of the District, a permittee may allow beer and light wine to be removed from the licensed premises as permitted in Section 4 of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. PUBLIC SAFETY MEASURES: The City, by and through its Police and Fire Departments, shall provide for adequate law enforcement and other public safety measures and services within the District as required by State Law. Nothing in this Ordinance shall amend or change any other ordinance pertaining to amplified music, noise, and litter or loitering.

SECTION 8. EXPIRATION: Unless repealed by operation of other law, the Temporary Citywide Leisure and Recreation District is to remain in place until such time as both the State of Mississippi and the City of Jackson remove the COVID-19 in-house dining restrictions and seating capacity limitations on restaurants and bars, at which time this Ordinance stands repealed.

SECTION 9. APPLICABILITY AND LIMITATIONS: This Ordinance does not supersede Sections 10-3 and 10-4 of the Jackson Code of Ordinances.

SECTION 10. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Ordinance shall become effective upon submission to the Mississippi Department of Revenue and satisfaction of any requirements of that agency.

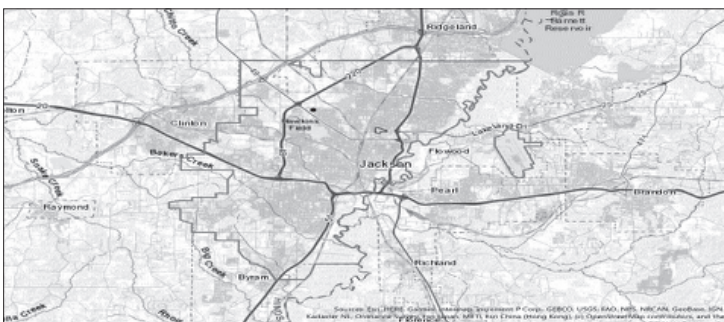

TEMPORARY GUIDELINES

- All mixed drink liquor, beer, wines, and alcohol provided curbside or drive-thru to an individual operating a motorized vehicle shall be served in a covered container with no straw.
- All mixed drink liquor and wine sales made carry out/curbside/drive-through must be associated with a minimum \$10.00 food purchase. Each container of alcohol must be associated with a minimum food purchase.
- Unless repealed by operation of other law, the Temporary Citywide Leisure and Recreation District is to remain in place until such time as the State of Mississippi and the City of Jackson remove the COVID-19 related in-house dining restrictions and seating capacity limitations on restaurants and bars, at which time this Ordinance stands repealed.
- Permittees located in the District may allow alcoholic beverages to be removed from the license premises every Monday at 10:00 a.m. until Sunday at 9:59 p.m.
- No permittee shall allow a patron, guest or member to exit its licensed premises with more than one uncovered container per entrée purchased of an alcoholic beverage, and it shall be unlawful for any person to exit such licensed premises with more than one such uncovered container per entrée sold.

Note 1: The objective of this Ordinance is primarily to allow pedestrians to carry uncovered containers of alcoholic beverages. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to allow patrons, guests, or members of a permittee to drive a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle while carrying an uncovered container of alcoholic beverage onto or into such vehicle. It shall be a violation of this Ordinance for any person to drive a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle while carrying an uncovered container, containing an alcoholic beverage within the District in which it was purchased. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to allow patrons, guests or members of a permittee to leave the District as a pedestrian or passenger in a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle of any kind while carrying an uncovered container of an alcoholic beverage.

Note 2: This ordinance does not allow driving with an open container. It is illegal to have an open container inside of a car ANYWHERE within the City of Jackson.

TEMPORARY GUIDELINES

- All mixed drink liquor, beer, wines, and alcohol provided curbside or drive-thru to an individual operating a motorized vehicle shall be served in a covered container with no straw.
- All mixed drink liquor and wine sales made carry out/curbside/drive-through must be associated with a minimum \$10.00 food purchase. Each container of alcohol must be associated with a minimum food purchase.
- Unless repealed by operation of other law, the Temporary Citywide Leisure and Recreation District is to remain in place until such time as the State of Mississippi and the City of Jackson remove the COVID-19 related in-house dining restrictions and seating capacity limitations on restaurants and bars, at which time this Ordinance stands repealed.
- Permittees located in the District may allow alcoholic beverages to be removed from the license premises every Monday at 10:00 a.m. until Sunday at 9:59 p.m.
- No permittee shall allow a patron, guest or member to exit its licensed premises with more than one uncovered container per entrée purchased of an alcoholic beverage, and it shall be unlawful for any person to exit such licensed premises with more than one such uncovered container per entrée sold.

Note 1: The objective of this Ordinance is primarily to allow pedestrians to carry uncovered containers of alcoholic beverages. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to allow patrons, guests, or members of a permittee to drive a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle while carrying an uncovered container of alcoholic beverage onto or into such vehicle. It shall be a violation of this Ordinance for any person to drive a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle while carrying an uncovered container, containing an alcoholic beverage within the District in which it was purchased. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to allow patrons, guests or members of a permittee to leave the District as a pedestrian or passenger in a motor vehicle or non-motor vehicle of any kind while carrying an uncovered container of an alcoholic beverage.

Note 2: This ordinance does not allow driving with an open container. It is illegal to have an open container inside of a car ANYWHERE within the City of Jackson.

Sometimes our own silence is too loud. I have been

I have been pained and troubled to the deepest pit of my soul by the horrible acts of hatred and bigotry that came to bear in the public killing of George Floyd. It was this act of police violence that I likened to the “straw that broke the camel’s back.” Enough is enough and it was time to say, no more killing of black men and women.

The justifiable outrage is not just in response to Floyd but to the age-old pervasive, persistent, systemic racism that we as black Americans have had to endure since our foreparents arrived in America. Like kudzu, it is difficult to destroy, enveloping entire structures when untreated.

I have asked as well as others, “how did we get here in 21st century America?” The sad fact is that we have been here – never moved too far beyond “the elusive here.” It appeared to lay dormant in a quasi-quiet phase for some years. However, in more recent years, a madness has been unleashed, revealing an unfettered hatred and increased, undeniable hate crimes.

Some of us, because of social and economic circumstances, might have wishfully thought that we were immune to the hatred and bigotry, often evidenced through police brutality, and that it was something applied to “others” – those who are involved in illegal activity.

Social media has opened a new reality that allows such acts of inhumane cruelty to be revealed in real time. And perhaps you, like me, who have sons, grandsons and granddaughters, were painfully reminded that our children could have been or could be the next black man or woman killed because they are black in America.

We recalled the generational lessons from our grandmothers and mothers of how to live and stay safe in America. And, our hearts ached. I know mine did as I cried out for an answer; when will the sickness of racism end. Is there a cure?

We are often silent because talking about racism makes some people, black and white, uncomfortable. As black Americans, we do not want to be viewed as angry blacks who can’t let go of the past. Whites want to avoid the conversation for fear they might be blamed for the problem. So, as a soci-

ety, we have been largely silent as we have fought for civil and human rights, focusing on explanatory terms like implicit, unconscious or selective biases. I am convinced we now must consistently and unrelentingly call the injustices and disparities that are killing our people and crippling America what they are – the outgrowth of systemic, institutional and structural racism. We can’t cure what we can’t name.

The scab of an unhealed sore has been lifted and the infection is oozing out and spreading across our nation, like kudzu. As we face the COVID 19 pandemic, rushing to find a vaccination, we are facing the pandemic of racism, equally as threatening. It is time to urgently find a vaccination, not just for the treatment, but the cure.

In my opinion, racism is more dangerous and threatening than any other pandemic known to humankind.

I have often said that racism and its resulting injustices, limit individuals and societies. I also know it has the power to unjustifiably kill, and most damningly, by some police officers who have the power to make it justifiable, if unrecorded. I am grateful to the good and decent

officers, principled and courageous enough to publicly say it is wrong.

I have spent most of my youth and professional life, in different ways, as a peaceful protester, vocal advocate and an engaged leader, speaking against injustices and helping to advance a more just, fair, humane and equitable world for all humankind.

I made social justice integral to the way we educated our students during my 17-year presidency at Tougaloo College. I remain committed to these ideals. I cannot say I am not angry. I will say my anger is not fueled or undergirded by hatred. I would be outraged by the unjustifiably killing of any human being because of respective differences, whether related to race, ethnicity, gender choice or religious affiliation. But, it seems that black people have no protection in America. So, no, I am not all right with any of this.

I am encouraged by the comments made by many of our nation’s leaders, colleagues and other associates who have spoken to the reality of black Americans, as well as the demonstration of global solidarity. I cannot convey how healing the acknowledgements are – the courage to vocally care and

willingness to be a part of the solution required to cure America of this insidious infection of racism – to share the responsibility of America’s problem.

It is time for all women and men of goodwill to stand and say, No More, as we together destroy the destructive seeds of racism and grow gardens filled with blooms of love, civility and respect. As we do this, let’s become more engaged in the affairs of our local communities and more neighborly, invest to strengthen our local businesses and schools, become more civically and political active and always exercise our voting rights.

Speak truth to power and remain non-violent. Violence is always destructively unhealthy.

I have been poignantly convicted by the words of two of my favorite quotes from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. – 1) “In the end, we will not remember the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends” and 2) “Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about the things that matter.”

The unjust killings of Black men and women matter too much to my future, your future and America’s democracy. Can I hear a ‘No More?’

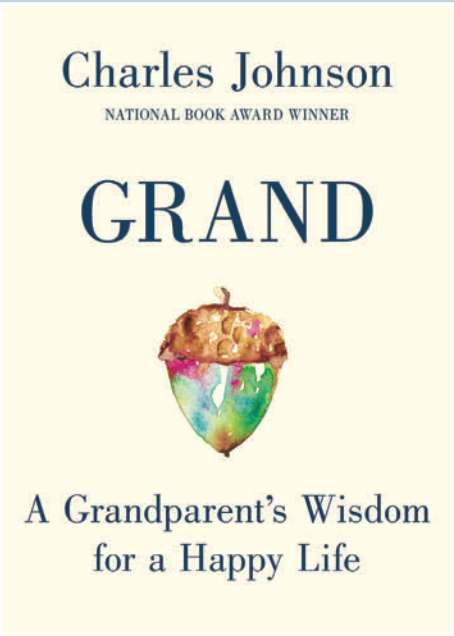

A GRANDPARENT’S WISDOM
FOR A HAPPY LIFE

That little face holds so much expectation. You meet the eyes of your grandchild, and you know you have a big job ahead of you. She expects you to love her as much as she loves you, and you do. He figures you’ll have fun together, and you will. They expect, quite frankly, to be spoiled a little, and that’ll happen, too. And with the new book “Grand” by Charles Johnson, a few lessons might be taught along the way... Some years ago, when


Charles Johnson helped design the elegant room that would be his home office, he had certain things in mind. Not one of them was that his grandson, Emery, would take the room as “his” office but that’s what happened, and that’s okay. The boy is an obvious delight. Emery’s thoughts, his willingness to share his world, and his points of view make Johnson proud; their relationship is easy and solid. This gives Johnson an ease of comparison between Emory and his ancestors, and lesson-filled stories to tell: Em-

ery loves books, though reading was denied to his forebears. At age eight, he doesn’t have to work like his great-granduncle did. He has nearly unlimited opportunities, unlike his great-grandfather. And yet, as a black man, Johnson knows that there are other lessons he needs to teach his grandson, lessons that go outside history and into the future. Be yourself, he’ll tell Emery, and know that the world has never seen anyone exactly like you. Don’t chase perfection because nothing is ever perfect.

Give dimension to your life by finding your purpose, take care of yourself, and care for others. Know that you’ll suffer, and that others will suffer, too. Look for beauty in life every day, even if it lies inside pain. Remember the “three gatekeepers” before you speak. Never be complacent with your skills, never stop learning, never stop being creative or curious. And know that there are three kinds of love. If you’re lucky, you’ll experience each one. When you found out that you were going to be a grandpar-

ent, do you remember how your mind raced with all the things you wanted to do with your grandbaby? Add ten more to that list after you’ve read “Grand,” but take a deep breath first. Author Charles Johnson writes with a quiet reserve here that borders on gravity in the lessons he has – and that you can offer – to a grandchild. That seriousness is often further weighed heavily with Buddhist teachings and philosophy that can turn downright sombre sometimes and the text, though

certainly filled with love and wisdom that ultimately leads to joy, can feel as though it begs for a lighter hand. Beware, too, that these sentiments aren’t meant for sudden talks: they’re lessons that start early and continue for decades. Even so, there are lessons here for elders as much as for their littles and despite its occasional excess depth, you should easily be able to proceed as you need. With the right mindset and “Grand,” you can expect good things.



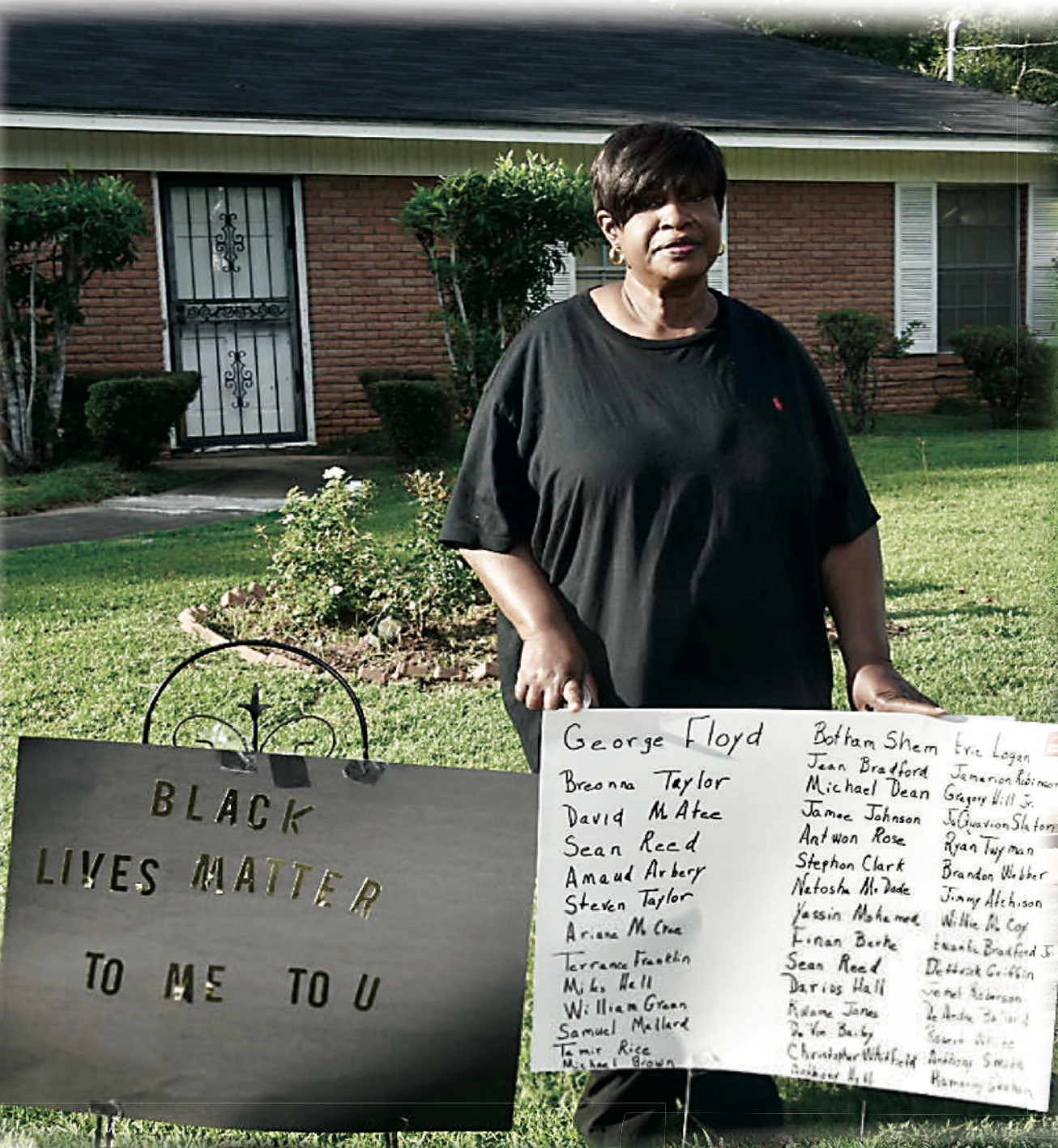

Saluting Anderson "Andy" Hardwick



“Daddy, growing up we didn’t know how much you meant to anyone besides Mama and us. It turns out that you mean the world to us and so many all across the nation. Thank you for keeping jazz alive in MS across 7 decades!”



Age 12, Hardwick played professionally with Fish Man Evans and the Bobcats in Vicksburg, MS. He later played with the Rhythm Aces and the Re-Bops. As a high school student at Alcorn Laboratory High School, he played in the college band. At 17, he was both an original member and the youngest member of the famous Red Tops. In 1957, Hardwick enlisted in the Army. Stationed in Paris, he directed and coordinated USO shows and all live entertainment for isolated American troops throughout Western Europe, the Middle East and North Africa. Off the clock, he “sat-in” with jazz greats such as Art Blakey, Clifford Browne, Dexter Gordon, Oscar Pettiford, Bud Powell, Lucky Thompson and Sarah Vaughn. He even befriended writer Richard Wright and fellow Mississippian. In 1960, Hardwick reintegrated into the live music scene in his hometown of Vicksburg. Upon his return, he helped to organize the group, the Corvettes and completed his studies at Alcorn. From 1967 until his retirement in 2002, Hardwick juggled music with his family and day jobs at the Tufts-Delta Health Center in Mound Bayou, then Jackson-Hinds Comprehensive Health Center, Paul Quinn College, then located in Waco, TX and Jackson-Hinds again. Locally, Hardwick for years played live jazz at Poets in the Quarters, the Ramada Inn–Renaissance and the Hilton where he played for the Sunday Jazz Brunch until the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.

During the years that Hardwick played at Poets, but particularly at the Hilton, he offered informal apprenticeships to budding musicians, like saxophonist Mike Burton. He frequently invited college students to sit in. The two venues served as training grounds for student musicians from area colleges, namely Jackson State University. Indeed, Hardwick represents a lifelong contribution to jazz. We thank you!
