

Legislative Black Caucuses from Mississippi and Tennessee Gather

Members of the Legislative Black Caucus from Mississippi and Tennessee joined together to present issues in their respective state legislatures. During the panel discussion the legislators stressed the importance of voting, regardless of what it looks like now, voting does count. A longtime member of the legislature from Mississippi, Senator Hillman Frazier, (D-Dist.27) explained how important the voting process really is, “We can’t stop now, and we must learn from our history to press on.”

Tennessee Senator Charlane Oliver, (D-Dist. 19) who has been stripped of her ability to serve on committees by the Senate Leadership, and salary has been cut, had strong words in her defense of her action. “When I stood on my desk in the Tennessee Senate, I was committed to standing firm for the rights in which our ancestors fought for, and to be denied that right caused me to take action that would make an impact beyond the Senate walls. I reflected on our past, looked at this dismal present, while working for a better future and knew, ‘I would not be moved’ “

Mississippi Legislators explained, because of the action in Tennessee, there was no special session in Mississippi. However, MS Rep. Lataisha Jackson, (D – Dist. 11) stated, “I was prepared to do what was necessary. It takes courage to vote and courage to stand up to those who do not want us to vote and take us back to a time, when we could not vote.”

The discussions dealt with a plethora of issues all the legislators face regardless of the states they are in; the struggle

continues. TN Rep. Harold M. Love, Jr., (D-Dist. 58) said, “It is important to stay engaged and be a participant. Regardless of these difficult times, we have to be educated about voting; register and vote. Also, understand, no one candidate may fit all of the requirements a constituent may require, however, if that candidate can make a positive impact, other requirements can be addressed later.” It was summed up by one attendee who said, “Getting some of all is better than all of nothing.”

Mississippi has 55 Black members in the legislature and uses the power of those numbers to best represent the people of the state.

Tennessee Black Caucus Chair, Rep. Jesse Chism, (D-Dist. 85) explained the elected officials need to hold more informational sessions, within our state and with other states, to make a strong footprint for the people. The reception/panel session was held Friday, August 28th, before the Big Game between Tennessee State University in Nashville and Jackson State University, in Jackson.

The event was a natural fit, held at the African Methodist Episcopal Church Sunday

83rd National Folk Festival and Mississippi Arts Commission unveil captivating program for Festival’s Mississippi Folklife Area

The wide-ranging program for the 83rd National Folk Festival’s Mississippi Folklife Area & Stage was announced this week at a press conference inside the House Chamber at the Old Capitol Museum. This is the event’s second year of a three-year residency, scheduled to take place November 13-15, 2026, in Downtown Jackson.

On hand for the announcement were Mississippi Arts Commission (MAC) Executive Director

David Lewis, and Director of the Two Mississippi Museums Michael Morris. Also participating were Shaquita Chapman, Community Engagement & Strategic Communications Coordinator, National Folk Festival; and Blaine Waide, Executive Director, National Council for the Traditional Arts (NCTA).

The Mississippi Folklife Area & Stage is a special component of the National Folk Festival, celebrating and showcasing the traditions held deeply in the state’s diverse communities. The Folklife Area shines a spotlight on the distinctive music, rituals, crafts, occupations, foodways, and other traditions at the heart of Mississippi’s cultural heritage, expressing both the state’s deep history and its evolving character.

“America’s rich palette and sounds are rooted right here in Mississippi,” said David Lewis,

executive director of the Mississippi Arts Commission “The Folklife Area is always a vital part of the National Folk Festival experience, but that’s especially true this year,” said NCTA Executive Director Blaine Waide.

Mississippi Flavor: At the Crossroads of the American Story will feature:

Alan Sibley & the Magnolia Ramblers of Ackerman, combining classic bluegrass standards, original gospel sounds, and classic instrumental licks in a style that harkens back to the music’s founding generation.

Eddie Cotton, Jr. of Clinton, a master of soul blues moving audiences, body and spirit, with blistering guitar work, stirring vocals, and a hard-driving style rooted in the church of his youth.

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Dr. Flonzie Brown-Wright Statewide Voter Registration Day

A press conference was held on the second-floor rotunda of the Mississippi Capitol Friday, August 28, 2026, at high noon. At its core was the naming of the Mississippi version of National Voter Registration Day – September 15, 2026 – for our very own living legend, Dr. Flonzie Brown-Wright. Brown-Wright is known the world over for her courage and determination as a civil rights activist and voting rights activist. She is a highly respected educator and author, who at fourscore and four, shows no signs of slowing down. In 1968, she became the first African American woman elected to public office in Mississippi since Reconstruction when she was elected as Election Commissioner in Madison County. She was accompanied her son, Lloyd Goodloe and her niece Vanessa Edmond.

State Representative Justice Robert Gibbs (D-72) served as moderator for the event. The revered Pastor of New Hope Baptist Church, Dr. Jerry Young, provided a powerful opening prayer with a special focus on the responsibility to vote and the need for selfless elected officials. Brown-Wright’s niece, Vanessa Edmond, shared “today is a day to honor a legacy...a Mississippi civil rights pioneer...honor the legacy, register the future...Flonzie Brown Goodloe Wright inspires me to move beyond words, and to see her legacy continue while she is here, and receive her flowers while she is on this earth, makes a difference in all of our lives.”

The Call to Action was provided by Pauline Rogers, Co-Founder of the RECH (Reaching and Educating for Community Hope) Organization. “To me today is about honor. When you don’t honor you lead with dishonor. We have dishonorable leadership all across this country...today we name this states voter registration day in honor of Dr. Flonzie Brown-Wright. It will be a day of honor every year and it will be about education and registration leading to participation. If you can’t

honor the person, you can’t honor the purpose. If you’re honoring what voting is, what it stands for, and the price that has been paid for it, you cannot honor going to the polls and checking a box. We’re trying to take you back to a place of honor that was dropped in our spirits years ago. We memorialize too much. Legacy is for the living, and we are glad that she is still here. We are putting purpose behind the name, acknowledging the sacrifices she made, the barriers she confronted, the doors she walked through, and the responsibility and the sacrifice...she carried the weight of voting in this state...today this gives worthy credit...honor must become action, honor is carried forward.”

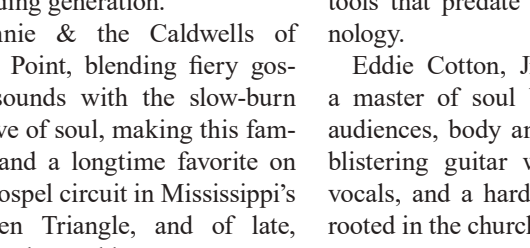
Gibbs reminded the audience that “Dr. Brown Wright helped thousands of Mississippians to register to vote. She moved Mississippi forward...she ensured that generations received greater opportunities.” State Senator Kamesha Mumford (D-26) shared that the very first time she heard the name of Flonzie Brown she was in the fourth grade at Holy Child Jesus School in Canton, and her teacher, Mrs. Starling, told the class that when Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was coming to Canton he called Flonzie Brown and asked her to arrange for housing and food for 3,000 people. Even as a fourth grader I knew that was a big deal, not like some after church potluck, and in true Flonzie Brown fashion, she gave a resounding yes. Her yes is now part of history.” She spoke about the relationship between fear and courage, the terror that was going on in 1966, and the importance of remembering the people who fought so that people like her could one day have a seat at the table of democracy.

State Representative Tamarra Grace Butler-Washington (D-69) gave remarks focused on the right to vote and the price that was paid to obtain that right. She honored Brown-Wright for her courage, persistence, and reinforcing that our voices matter. She spoke about the appropriateness of Mississippi

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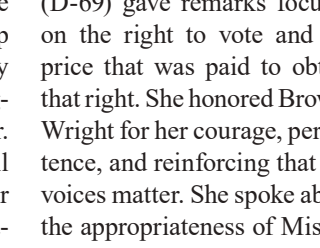
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Jackson City Branch NAACP Announces 98th Annual Freedom Fund Banquet Celebrating the “Year of Medgar”

The annual event also helps sustain the branch’s advocacy, youth engagement, and community-service initiatives.

“This banquet is both a celebration and a call to action,” said Queen Hatfield, Banquet Chair. “We invite the entire community to join us as we honor the life of Medgar Evers, recognize local changemakers, and strengthen the collective movement for justice.”

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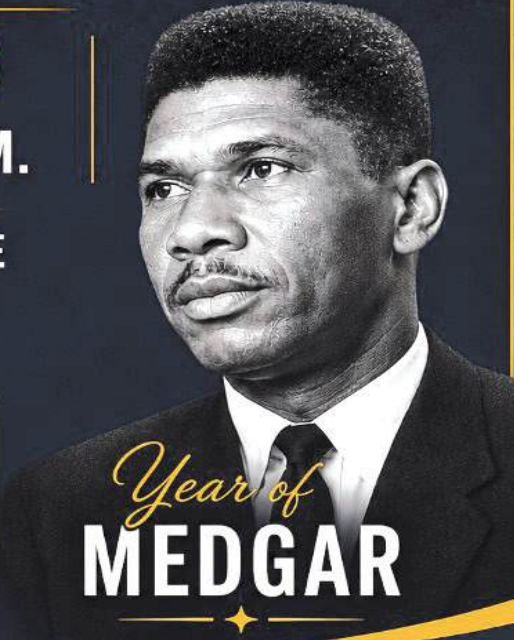

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issippi’s Voter Registration Day being named in her honor, a day that will be celebrated for the power of civic participation.

Mississippi’s Director for The Southern Poverty Law Center, Waikinya Clanton, came next and drew attention to the importance of dates, and focused on August 28th. Emmitt Till was abducted and brutally murdered on August 28, 1955. Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his I Have a Dream speech on August 28, 1963. And in 1968, Dr. Flonzie Brown-Wright was elected to public office as Beat 1 Election Commissioner in Madison County. “Her’s is a legacy of courage, sacrifice, and participation...”

Prior to concluding the press conference, Gibbs gave thanks to the family of Brown-

Wright. He provided a closing prayer asking for strength as we try to move our state forward. Lloyd Goodloe presented a proclamation from Jackson Mayor John Horhn to his mother. Dr. Brown-Wright gave thanks for the event and all the attendees before leaning in hard. “No matter what goes on at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, I am not going back.” She spoke very briefly about the importance of voting, and encouraged voter participation in a way we don’t often hear. “Go for your ancestors who couldn’t vote.”

NOTICE OF A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED BUDGET AND PROPOSED TAX LEVIES FOR THE UPCOMING FISCAL YEAR FOR THE CITY OF JACKSON

The City of Jackson will hold a public hearing on its proposed budget and proposed tax levies for fiscal year 2026-2027 on Thursday, September 3, 2026 at 6:00 p.m. in Council Chambers located in City Hall, 219 South President Street, Jackson, Mississippi 39201.

The City of Jackson is now operating projected total budget revenue of \$337,921,621 (23.0 percent) or \$77,766,333 of such revenue is obtained through ad valorem taxes. For the next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$340,558,694. Of that amount, (23.4 percent) or \$79,517,344, is proposed to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy. The decision to not increase the ad valorem tax millage rate for fiscal year 2026-2027 above the current fiscal year’s ad valorem tax millage rate means you will not pay more in ad valorem taxes on your home, automobile tag, utilities, business fixtures and equipment, and rental real property unless the assessed value of your property has increased for fiscal year 2026-2027. Any citizen of City of Jackson is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed budget and tax levies for fiscal year 2026-2027 and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken.

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Emmitt Till Remembered

Three days of activities were held in Mississippi to commemorate the 71st anniversary of the death of Emmett Till, an African American who was abducted and lynched in Mississippi in 1955 at the age of fourteen. Emmett Till's Legacy Foundation, family members, and Civil Rights advocates hosted the events.

A press conference at the Mississippi State Capitol Friday, Aug. 28, 2026 kicked off the commemoration. Speakers included family members, civil rights leaders, and elected officials.

Deborah Watts, the cousin of Emmett Till spoke about the "heavy lift" of carrying the family's legacy. She emphasized the

ongoing responsibility of educating future generations so they will be able to carry forward the legacy of Emmett Till and his mother, Mamie Till-Mobley.

City of Jackson Mayor John Horhn stated, "On this day, a 14-year-old, innocent young man's life was taken in a heinous, brutal, thoughtless crime because of the way he looked."

A historical guided bus tour, 'Trail of Tears and Terror' departed Jackson Aug. 29th at 12:00 noon, transporting attendees to key historical sites and national monuments in the Mississippi Delta.

On Sunday, 30th a Worship in White Service was held 11:00 AM at the historical Farish Street Baptist Church located at 619 N. Farish Street in Jackson.

The service honored the memory of Emmett Till. Many surviving members of his family traveled from all over the county were present, and dressed in white as were many church members, visitors, and friends.

The service focused on how Emmett Till's name continues to serve as a catalyst for civil rights and social change. In his sermon, Farish Street Pastor, Rev. Eric Williams shared biblical parallels regarding Emmett Till's lynching and the courage of Till's mother, Mamie Till-Mobly.

Emmett Till's cousin Watts also spoke during this service. "Faith is what grounded our family," she said. "Faith is something that brought meaning to Mamie and gave her the ability to stand

and speak truth to power."

Jay Johnson who was at both the press conference and service at Farish Street was very pleased with the activities surrounding the commemoration of his death in Mississippi; however, in recalling his own visit several years ago to the sites where Till was brutally murdered, thrown into the river, pulled out of the river, and other historical sites relating to Till's death, Johnson stated, "I'm still surprised at where we are in this state as far as race relations are concerned. It is a shame that similar situations are going on all over the country simply due to hatred.

After the service, a community gathering and dinner send-off, 'Breaking Bread Together' was held at the church.

An Open Letter to local media leadership

Open Letter to the leadership of WLBT and WDBD (Gray Media), WAPT (Hearst Television), WJTV (Nexstar), Clarion Ledger (Gannett/USA Today), Mississippi Today (Deep South Today), and Mississippi Free Press.

While other news outlets provide coverage of news in Mississippi, it could easily be said that your platforms make up what are considered mainstream print and digital media leaders in our state. Combined with African American focused platforms like The Mississippi Link newspaper and The Jackson Advocate, Mississippians and often those far beyond our state, are

served well by your commitment to journalism and telling the stories of our lives. On a personal level, I consume your news products daily and contribute a small amount annually to the non-profits Mississippi Today and Mississippi Free Press.

Each of your platforms publishes policy statements where words like truthfulness, fairness, independence, responsibility, quality, lack of bias, ethical standards and practices, sourcing, and factchecking can be found. These policies independently and collectively become the foundation of your professionalism, deserving of the gratitude and respect of the public.

Yet over the past several months, I have reached out via email to each of your platform leaders about a specific

topic and have not received a single response. The topic is Minority Contracting in Mississippi. In FY2025, Mississippi awarded contracts totaling \$5.5 billion dollars per the Mississippi Development Authority Annual Minority Participation Report. The numbers contained in this comprehensive and bulky report demonstrate that over 99 percent of contract expenditures went to white people. Less than 1 percent went to non-white people (Asian, Asian Pacific, Hispanic, African American, and Native Americans.) While I have been writing about this state-sponsored and legislature approved discrimination for the last four years for The Mississippi Link newspaper, none of you have truly been covering it.

Please ask yourselves why you are

not covering this atrocity that has been going on year after year in our state government for as long as can be remembered? Where are the watchdogs? Where is the Fourth Estate when it comes to state-sponsored discrimination that uses the tax dollars of all Mississippians.

Surely, we know this behavior is not limited to Mississippi. Corruption and discrimination can be found in every state. Yet isn't it not especially hellish that this goes on in the poorest state in the nation? What does it say about media organizations that are quick to devote their resources to providing coverage of people hanging from trees in Mississippi, but not cover a system that uses approximately 20 percent of the state's annual budget while crippling

the economics of a rock-bottom minimum of 42 percent of our state's population?

Maybe, just maybe, it's all perfectly legal. But on its face, it is unethical and immoral. For those reasons alone, it must be covered by people and organizations that are anchored in fairness and justice for all. To continue not covering this subject is to enable the state's behavior to continue, perhaps even being considered complicit. I'm sure you all remember Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s quote about silence. In his book, Stride Toward Freedom, he wrote, "We will have to repent in this generation, not only for the evil words and deeds of the bad people, but for the appalling silence of the good people."

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Civil rights groups make urgent plea for voting rights in DC, ahead of midterm elections

Voting rights, the work of the Civil Rights Movement and racial justice took center stage on the National Mall last week, with protesters gathering ahead of midterm elections and following a wave of changes to voting laws and redistricting that some have condemned as detrimental to Black Americans.

Hundreds of people rallied on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial for the 2026 “Defend the Vote” March on Washington, organized by the Rev. Al Sharpton and Martin Luther King III, echoing the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.’s 1963 march. The event follows the U.S. Supreme Court’s landmark April decision in *Louisiana v. Calais* that reinterpreted key provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, allowing Southern states to redraw their congressional maps in a way that erodes equal representation in Black communities.

“We’ve been doing these marches for years, but this is probably the most important because this is the first year we are marching that the voting rights bill has been nullified by the Supreme Court,” Sharpton, founder of the National Action Network, said in an interview with The Associated Press.

Civil rights leaders and major Democratic political figures rallied attendees before rallygoers marched past national monuments, including the late King’s memorial.

Some call it a ‘very dangerous moment in American history’

The event harkened back to King Jr.’s historic March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in 1963, when more than 200,000 people gathered at the foot of the Lincoln Memorial. That march, an inflection point in the Civil Rights Movement, came at a fraught moment, when economic headwinds, civil unrest, political division and the Vietnam War bitterly divided Americans.

Sen. Bernie Sanders, I-Vt., one of dozens of speakers at the event, said that now is a “very dangerous moment in American history” and that the “dream of a more just and equitable society has never been under greater threat than it is right now.”

He placed blame on Republican President Donald Trump and the Supreme Court’s conservative majority, listing attempts to purge voter rolls, obtain sensitive voter data, restrict mail-in and early voting, and redraw

congressional districts as part of threats to voting rights.

“Today, we have a president along with the Supreme Court members he appointed carrying out the most significant assault on voting rights since segregation, targeting virtually every aspect of the electoral system,” Sanders said.

Martin Luther King III told the AP the Civil Rights Movement’s work “is further eroding” in the wake of the April ruling.

He said his father would be disappointed with the state of the country, but current civil rights advocates should be undaunted.

“Had he lived, we’d be on a totally different trajectory,” the younger King said. “These would not be issues; they would have been resolved. I don’t think he would be surprised because he understands our history and understands those who are trying to retain power. But the challenge is challenging our communities to engage even more.”

King’s Drum Major Institute, a progressive think tank and community action group, co-hosted the march with Sharpton’s group.

Ray Turner, a 65-year-old Maryland

retiree, sat Friday on the steps in front of the Lincoln Memorial. He came independently, carrying a sign that read “(Puny) Hands off our elections.”

“The lies about the 2020 election being stolen continue to be sounded, even though they’ve been disproved,” Turner said, adding, “Now they’re trying to use this to prevent people who are legal citizens, legal voters, from voting.”

Sharpton said the Trump administration’s immigration policy for Haitians and white South Africans, as well as cuts to social programs, are unifying concerns for this year’s march attendees. But redistricting efforts by Republican-led states that reduce the number of Black lawmakers in Congress loom large.

“This march is about people who refuse to be counted out. When the courts and the legislature broke apart District 6, they did not just redraw lines,” Rep. Cleo Fields, D-La., said in a texted statement. “They told hundreds of thousands of Black families from Baton Rouge up through the Delta that their voice could be taken away at any moment.”

Fields’ district was central in the Supreme Court decision that hollowed

out the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The court ruled that his district, created just one term ago to permit a second majority-Black district in a state where Blacks make up 33% of the population, was unconstitutional because it relied too heavily on race.

The court has held that maps can be redrawn for partisan reasons.

Louisiana’s legislature rushed to redraw the district after the decision, reshaping it to cluster around predominantly white communities in the Baton Rouge area and southern Louisiana.

Fields has opted not to seek reelection to Congress and instead is pursuing a seat in the state Senate.

Rep. Troy Carter, D-La., said that communities in his district “have felt the pain of being the tip of the spear” of the national redistricting fight. He warned that the ruling will likely impact state and local legislative seats during the 2028 election cycle.

“The scene of the crime is Louisiana, but the reverberation of its impact will be throughout the entire country,” said Carter.

Embattled Black lawmakers see need for continued rights push

Rep. Shomari Figures, an Alabama Democrat whose majority-Black district

was targeted by the state’s Republican-led redistricting effort, said the original voting rights fight required local movements, national figures, lots of coordination and strategy. He sees this year’s march as a continuation of that legacy.

“My district includes Montgomery, which was the birthplace of it all. It started with a bus boycott in 1955 and that, ultimately, morphed into a broader struggle for civil rights and led to a broader Civil Rights Movement,” Figures told the AP.

Ahead of this event, organizations participating in the march filed new claims in their federal lawsuit against President Donald Trump’s executive order restricting mail-in voting. The Supreme Court cleared a path Monday for possible implementation of the order, though it remains unclear how much can be put in place before the midterms.

Late last week, a federal judge in Boston who is hearing some of the lawsuits against that executive order temporarily halted the administration from moving forward with it. Time is running short to make any significant changes to voting in the midterms, with the first mail ballots scheduled to be sent out next week.

What if the car breaks down? What if the kids need x, y, or z? What if overtime gets cut back? What if Social Security goes bankrupt?

Are you a democratic socialist yet?

That’s not where Blues go Red and turn communist. It’s about a government that puts

people before profits. And cares for all of us. Not just the billionaires.

Angie Nixon

In last week’s Florida primary, people around the country saw Florida legislator Angie Nixon win the Democratic U.S. Senate primary with a stunning upset over Alex Vindman.

Vindman was well-funded (\$16.3 million to Nixon’s \$975,000), and well-connected nationally. But Nixon—an African American with state house cred, union organizing experience, and a fighter who was arrested protesting Gov. Ron DeSantis’ redistricting efforts—proved to be unbeatable. She’s officially aligned

with the Democratic Socialists of America (DSA).

That means Nixon, 42, believes in universal health care, a/k/a “Medicare for all,” taxing the wealthy, and a minimum wage of \$25 an hour.

Think back to that comfort level survey. At 40 hours a week, \$25 an hour is just \$1,000 a week or \$52,000 a year. It’s not even half what that survey said was needed for a single person to be “comfortable” in California.

We’re forced to get 3-4 low-wage jobs.

Nixon and the DSA want to set the floor, so no one sinks into oblivion.

Republicans would simply let us all sink.

Nixon now goes up against Republican Sen. Ashley Moody in November. Florida’s Republicans outnumber Dems by 1.5 million voters. And Nixon’s DSA tag makes her a clear underdog, maybe even unelectable.

But the Dems are sticking with her. Voters seem to be turning out for someone who will directly and boldly address affordability.

Meanwhile, Trump is turning the Iran War, which has caused the oil price run-up and high inflation, into an economic war on the world. At the same time, he’s declared a tariff war on our good ally, Canada, guaranteed to raise prices on imports to America.

That could make Nixon the one in Florida 2026. And it would move Dems closer to flipping both houses of Congress, a vote for super normalcy.

Trump is so far down in the polls, he’s resorted to election disruption and voter suppression.

But the antidote in Florida at least is Angie Nixon, a woman worth watching, who’ll turn you into a Democratic Socialist if Donald Trump hasn’t done so already.

Two civil rights men, different parties, one Bill of Rights

Most gun deaths in this country are suicides. We argue about guns as if they were all murders.

When I was a boy two brothers lived on our block and we ran together every weekend. Ball in the street, made-up games, War!

Then one day they were gone. My buddy said their father had lost his job at the tire factory and taken his own life in the basement, with a gun the family already owned.

That was a gun death in America. Quiet street, good schools. In all my years arguing guns, a death like that almost never came up.

Our children are back in school, and September is Suicide Prevention Month.

Guns, children, and despair are one subject. We rarely treat them so.

My friend Lenny McAllister has never made me pick. He is a Black Republican, a voice on Rust Belt radio from WVON in Chicago to KDKA in Pittsburgh. I was the Democratic nominee for governor of Maryland. We have gone at each other’s parties twenty years and stayed friends.

What people miss is that we are both civil rights men, and civil rights work is Bill of Rights work.

The First Amendment is why we could march. The Fourth is why an officer needs a reason to search you. The Second sits in that same document, and we believe in all of it.

Lenny’s father was shot on a Rust Belt street and spent nearly a year in the hospital. In 2001 a man broke into Lenny’s home and tied him up. He tells it in his new book, “A Venn Diagram of One”, an honest book about refusing to be one thing in a country that insists you choose.

My cousin was shot and killed at a gas station in Columbia, Maryland, at noon. A cousin I called uncle agreed to testify against a Prince George’s County drug dealer, who shot him at his door. He lived. At the hospital they would not let us up to his room, for fear the shooter’s friends would come finish the job.

When Lenny writes that we can respect the Second Amendment and still use common sense about who buys a gun, I hear no man splitting a difference. I hear a man who has waited on word about his father, and lain on his own floor with a gun at his head.

Then he writes this. “There is a right greater than the right to bear arms; it is the right to a liberty-filled life.”

Now let me tell you what I got wrong. Thirty years ago at Oxford I needed a thesis topic. A headline in the International Herald Tribune stopped me on the sidewalk. Black teen suicides were surging. I was sure I knew why. Hand-guns were flooding the inner cities.

I was wrong. The children dying were not in the cities. They were in the suburbs.

Black families moved out there in the late sixties and seventies. Twenty years later their children began killing themselves. Children like me, with the big backyard and the shiny bike.

Our mothers gave us what they had been denied in the projects and tenements and row houses they came up in. Without meaning to, they cost us the one thing those places had, a house full of family who would listen no matter what.

One of the strongest predictors of a suicide attempt is isolation. Ask a woman how many people she talks to after her worst day and she names two or three. Ask a man and he names one, or nobody. Her circle grows all her life. His shrinks toward zero.

That headline should have said the Black teen suicide rate was catching up to the White one. Among young Black men it has passed it.

About nine in ten suicide attempts with a gun end in death. With most other methods people live, and most who live never die by suicide.

In 2024 there were 27,593 gun suicides, well over half of all gun deaths.

Money is no shield. A gun in a cul-de-sac is as final as a gun on a corner.

The Bill of Rights is not a menu. You do not get to order the Second and send the rest back to the kitchen. None of it means much to a child who does not live to grow into the promise of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

So set partisanship aside. Lock your own guns in a safe at home. Keep them away from people in crisis. And build friendships across party lines that bind this nation back together for all our children.

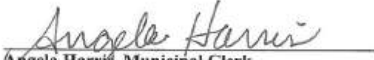

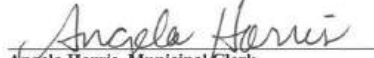

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI, AUTHORIZING A COMMUNITY CODE ENFORCEMENT VOLUNTEER PILOT PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, the City of Jackson is currently undergoing critical infrastructure stabilization efforts, including but not limited to water, wastewater, drainage, and electrical reliability; and

WHEREAS, large-scale data centers, particularly hyperscale facilities, require substantial and continuous consumption of water and electricity, and may place additional strain on municipal systems; and

WHEREAS, jurisdictions across the United States have identified risks associated with data center development, including excessive utility consumption, environmental impacts, noise pollution, and land use incompatibility; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jackson must ensure that any new industrial-scale development aligns with its infrastructure capacity, public health priorities, and long-term economic development strategy; and

WHEREAS, existing zoning classifications do not adequately distinguish between traditional commercial uses and industrial-scale data processing facilities; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it necessary to temporarily suspend certain data center and data center-related facility developments while establishing appropriate regulatory standards to protect residents and municipal resources.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Jackson, Mississippi following review, consideration, and discussion, that a temporary moratorium on accepting special use permits, conditional use permits, Zoning Map Amendments (rezoning requests), building permits (except for interior renovations that do not expand capacity or impact exterior appearance/noise), and any other development approval required by law for data centers and data center-related facilities be utilized to allow the City of Jackson time to further study the concerns expressed by residents and taxpayers, and develop comprehensive rules and regulations for the siting of data centers and data center-related facilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Jackson, the following shall be known and cited as the City of Jackson’s Data Center and Data Center-Related Facilities Moratorium Ordinance.

SECTION 1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this ordinance is to:

- Protect the City’s water, sewer, and electrical infrastructure.
- Ensure compatibility of land use with surrounding communities.
- Prevent disproportionate environmental burdens on vulnerable neighborhoods.
- Establish a regulatory framework for future data center development.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS

For purposes of this ordinance:

(a) Data Center

A facility which houses the necessary computer servers, systems, or networks and related hardware, wiring, data transmitters, and other components required for the remote storage or processing, transfer, backup and recovery, analysis, or processing of digital data. Further, a data center may also include a facility that engages in developing computer technology, software development, programming, data analytics, and digital media.

(b) Data Center-Related Facilities

This term shall include the on-site exterior equipment and facilities necessary for the safe, secure, and compatible operation of a Data Center, including but not limited to: HVAC equipment, emergency and primary power generation equipment and facilities, including those necessary to interface with the electric grid system; and sound or emissions attenuation devices.

SECTION 3. TEMPORARY MORATORIUM

(a) A temporary moratorium is hereby imposed for a period of 183 calendar days from the effective date of this Ordinance. During this period, the City of Jackson shall not accept, process, or approve any application for the following development approvals:

- Special Use Permits
- Conditional Use Permits
- Zoning Map Amendments (rezoning requests)

• Building Permits (except for interior renovations that do not expand capacity or impact exterior appearance/noise)

• Any other development approval required by law for the establishment, construction, erection, alteration, or expansion of any data center or data center-related facilities.

(b) This moratorium shall remain in effect unless it is earlier terminated, extended, or modified by the City Council following state law.

SECTION 4. EXEMPTIONS

The following are exempt:

Any development that has received a valid development approval in accordance with the City’s Zoning Ordinance prior to the effective date of this Ordinance;

Existing data centers conducting routine maintenance or minor upgrades;

Facilities supporting public safety, emergency management, or government operations;

Projects that have received full and final site plan approval prior to the effective date; and

Emissions disclosures (including backup generators).

Any lands that are adjacent to the Jackson-Medgar Wiley Evers International Airport.

SECTION 5. COMMUNITY PROTECTION REQUIREMENTS

All future data center proposals may, at the discretion of the Department of Planning and Development, include:

A Community Impact Statement.

A Public Hearing prior to approval.

A Community Benefits Agreement, where applicable.

SECTION 6. ZONING AND LAND USE REVIEW

During the moratorium period, the City shall take the following actions:

Investigate the potential impacts of data centers and data-center related facilities.

Draft specific land use ordinance amendments and standards to regulate these facilities, including appropriate zoning districts, setback requirements, noise limitations, and utility capacity conditions.

Distinguish between commercial-scale and industrial-scale operations

Consider holding public workshops and Planning Board meetings to review the draft amendments and gather public input.

Identify appropriate districts for potential development

Consider prohibiting placement near residential zones, schools, and critical community facilities unless special approval is granted.

SECTION 7. SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or provision of this Ordinance is declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, and provision thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more portions may be declared invalid.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE

The City Council finds that immediate enactment of this Ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, safety, and welfare, and that good cause exists for its immediate effectiveness. The City currently lacks zoning, permitting, and development standards governing data centers and requires additional time to evaluate potential impacts on public infrastructure, utilities, and surrounding properties, as well as to consider appropriate regulations. Absent this temporary moratorium, applications may be submitted and vested rights may arise before such regulations can be adopted. Accordingly, upon passage by the unanimous vote required by law, this Ordinance shall become effective immediately.

Otherwise, this Ordinance shall take effect one month after its passage, and publication under applicable law and City procedures.

SO ORDAINED, this 14th day of July 2026.

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Dr. Charles “Smarty Pants” King Jr.’s Educational Services, a nontraditional approach to learning inspires youth

Dr. Charles “Smarty Pants” Jr. was born in Memphis, Tenn., but much of his childhood was spent in Battle Creek, Mich. He recalls having struggled during the learning process. He saw the traditional system as one that embarked on the rights of children by insisting that they should all learn the same way. He saw repeatedly how authoritative figures lumped the children into “one category” of learning. He realized that he was hindered and that his educational growth was stifled.

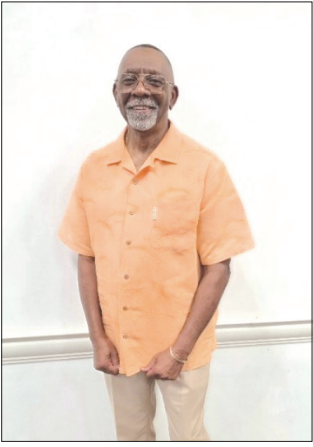
“I believe that I wasn’t taught to think in school, so I created my own program. That program – “Dr. Charles Smarty Pants King Jr.’s Educational Services” – was founded in 1980. The program emphasizes that children learn better by seeing; they do what they see. Consequently, King asks participants to look at him. When they look, “they copy me.”

In his book, “My Pants Make Me Smart,” the author specifies his targeted audience from age two to seniors. He explains that everybody comes to earth with a purpose. Thus, “there is no box in teaching out the box.” What he means is children should be taught to use imagination. “They shouldn’t get caught up in thinking a certain way.”

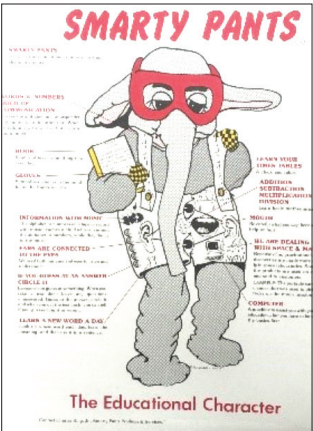
The dominant animal of the book is the elephant. “Smarty Pants” references the educational symbols on the elephant’s pants. A few are mentioned here. “Words and symbols hold up communication. The book says read and learn something new every day. Gloves symbolize what’s in the mind and heart...A child is taught the alphabet and numbers while dancing to the music. The ears are connected to the eyes, and we need both our ears and eyes to listen and understand.”

The nontraditional representative is calling youth to use the voice – the steer – inside of them. He advocates that they should look and listen to that particular voice. “If bad voices tell them to do something wrong, if they know that’s wrong, they should not do it,” he said.

King devoted thirty years to getting children acclimated to learning that was consistent to their individual needs. Apart from traditional learning implemented in states’ systems, this new approach entails avenues that spread directly to the individual’s specific in-

terests that encourage learning. Upon his retirement from teaching Mississippi children, King received House Resolution No. 50 from the House of Representatives for having inspired youth throughout the state. Teaching included magic, brain teasers and art work which encompassed 2,000 pieces by disguising puzzles or riddles or symbols.

The honoree identifies himself as one who is self-taught. “Virtually all the great Black folk artists were self-taught and relate that they were initially inspired to create through divine calling, or dreams. True to that mode, I talk to God as one of my major influences in the same way another young artist would credit an old master,” he voiced.

The educator is a firm advocate of his philosophy, “If [children] can’t learn the way I teach, then I must learn to teach the way [they] can learn.” He supports this tenet by emphasizing that all children are “teachable.” All children are different. While some persons have to study with no sound, King asserted that during his college days, “I played music while I studied.”

The nontraditional teaching advocate desires that Mississippi youth “leave this world in a better place than what they found it.” They should not look at the way things are [and be content]. Rather, “they should use their imagination and ask, how can things be improved.”

What does King have to say about his experiences with people? He expresses joy in having learned from them. Summarizing conditions on earth, he emphasizes that both heaven and hell are here. Instead of living in fear, he concentrates on looking for the good in people. Further, he reminds parents that children are our future. Every word we use has “vibration” and meaning.

King is a stickler for separating truth from falsehood. He cites an example of a 17-year-old female, one of forty- six students of gang affiliation, who was “put out of” the Jackson Public School System. “She stated that she was raised by her grandmother, and she has three young boys. Her grandmother told her that if she kissed a boy, she would get pregnant. She said she never kissed a boy, and yet, she has three boys.” The mother explained that if she knew the truth, she perhaps would not have gotten pregnant.

On another note, King contends that a person’s thoughts can make the difference between failure and success. Thus, he recommends that instead of saying, “I’m going to try,” say, “I’m going to do it.” Therein lies “power.”

King advises the State of Mississippi to give its educational institutions the authority to implement his system of learning for today’s youth. Rather than saying, “no,” being open to this new idea of teaching would allow teachers and administrators to use a new teaching tool and youth to benefit for a new outlook on life and productivity.

Not one to run away from work, productivity, and human relations, King continues to thrive and aid others in reaching their utopia. He understands the need to meet people where they are and to work with them accordingly. He serves as a volunteer for the Two Mississippi Museums, Urban League Food Program, Cooperation Jackson and Alternatives Do Matter Second Chance Program which serves communities through education, support, empowerment and meaningful service.

“What Does This Moment Require of Us?” - President Wiggins Challenges Tougaloo College at the 2026–27 Academic Year Annual Convocation

President Corey Wiggins challenges the Tougaloo community to honor its legacy while building an institution that is prepared, proud, purposeful, and progressive.

On August 26, the Tougaloo College family gathered for its annual Convocation, welcoming the 2026–27 academic year and honoring the College’s 15th President, Dr. Corey Wiggins. Students, faculty, staff, trustees, alumni, donors, partners, community leaders, and friends filled the arena, creating a powerful display of unity around the institution’s mission and the work ahead.

Among the distinguished guests were President Blake Thompson, the 20th President of Mississippi Christian University, and Dr. Beverly Hogan, Tougaloo College’s first female president and its 13th president.

Evoking the spirit of Tougaloo’s institutional ancestors and grounding his remarks in faith, Wiggins reflected on the experiences and connections that brought him to his current role. His message emphasized that Tougaloo’s history is not simply something to remember, but a foundation from which the College must continue to move forward.

He challenged faculty to push students through rigorous, meaningful instruction, encouraging them to foster curiosity and deeper thinking. Students were urged to question what they believe they already know and to remain open to learning. Staff members were reminded that every interaction with a student is significant, while alumni were encouraged to remain

engaged and to support their alma mater through continued service and giving.

“What must we be willing to protect, build, and become?”

President Wiggins highlighted the American Missionary Association (AMA), which founded Tougaloo College in 1869 and provided educational opportunities for formerly enslaved people and their descendants. He also honored the Tougaloo Nine, the nine Tougaloo College students who staged a historic read-in at the Jackson Municipal Library on March 27, 1961, challenging the library’s whites-only policy and becoming an important part of Mississippi’s Civil Rights history.

Wiggins also recognized the legacy of Civil Rights figures whose work intersected with Tougaloo College, including Bob Moses, Fannie Lou Hamer, Medgar Evers,

and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Their stories, he reminded students, represent more than moments in history. They demonstrate what can happen when individuals are willing to act with courage, conviction, and purpose.

Students were encouraged to embrace the purpose of Tougaloo College: the audacity to build generational legacy, to prepare, to educate, to lead, and to be free.

“What does this moment require of us?”

The answer, he suggested, begins with Tougaloo’s enduring mission: “To learn, lead, and serve.”

Wiggins emphasized that the College must pair courage with common sense, ensuring that bold action remains rooted in purpose.

Wiggins described his responsibility as both an honor and a charge: “To honor what Tougaloo has been doing, while making sure Tougaloo is strong enough to become what this moment requires.”

That commitment includes asking difficult questions and maintaining an honest assessment of the institution—recognizing what is working, acknowledging what is not, and having the courage to make necessary changes.

Respecting tradition, Wiggins noted, does not mean preserving every practice simply because it has always been done. Sometimes, he said, the most courageous thing an institution can do is change.

President Wiggins closed with a vision of an institution committed to continuous improvement - one that prepares its students not merely to enter the world, but to lead within it, making Tougaloo better today for the students of tomorrow.

BOOK REVIEW: KIDS BOOKS FOR ALMOST-FALL

Pretty soon, you'll want to add another blanket to your bed at night.

You'll want a jacket or sweater when you go outside, and your shoes won't be sandals pretty soon. Fall is coming, and you'll be staying indoors a little bit more, which means you'll have time to read and these books are great for your fall...

Have you had a good summer? Most people have – but some kids are sad this fall, and

in the new book "Love Lives On" by Dorena Williamson, illustrated by Ana Latese (Magination Press, \$19.99), Will's family has experienced a tragedy and it's pretty scary.

How the adults around him react, dealing with loss and gun violence, grief and healing are at the heart of this book. Beware of that before you hand it to a sensitive child – but if your 4-to-7-year-old needs a book like this, here's a helpful story for you all.

Determination. That's what you want for your child, and

"Better Than a Touchdown" by Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Jalen Hurts, illustrated by Nneka Myers (Flamingo Books, \$19.99) will get your child in the right direction.

When Jalen arrives for his first day of school, his friends break the bad news to him: there won't be any school football this year. What? Jalen was sure that this year, the perfect touchdown was within his grasp. He tried other activities, but nothing compared to football – and then he thought of an idea that just might work. Was

it possible, with teamwork, to have a football season of their own? Your 3-to-7-year-old will want to find out.

So your child is a little bit different. Big deal. In "Simply Winnie" by Supermodel Winnie Harlow, illustrated by Sawyer Cloud (Penguin Workshop, \$19.99), that difference is actually a benefit.

Willie is an artist, a painter, a designer, a glam-girl, and she's fabulous! But Winnie doesn't fit in sometimes, and she hates looking like everybody else. Even her new best friend likes

to go along with the crowd, so Winnie wonders which is better: to be like other kids or to just be Winnie? How can a one-of-a-kind girl be true to her one-in-a-million self? Kids ages 3-to-7 will love this book, especially if they're uniquely beautiful, too.

And finally, for the kid who wants a story with meaning and lots of pictures, look for "Black Hands: Builders of Our Nation" by Carole Boston Weatherford, illustrated by R. Gregory Christie (Crown, \$19.99). Black history isn't just

a once in a year thing, as this book shows. Its powerful but spare narrative is great for quiet times, and the words are such that you can read them every day. For your 2-to-5-year-old, they'll sink in quick.

If these books are not exactly what your child will enjoy, then head to your favorite bookstore or library and ask to be directed to the kids' section. There, you'll find lots to read, and access to even more books for kids of any age. Find these four books or more, and sit down pretty soon.

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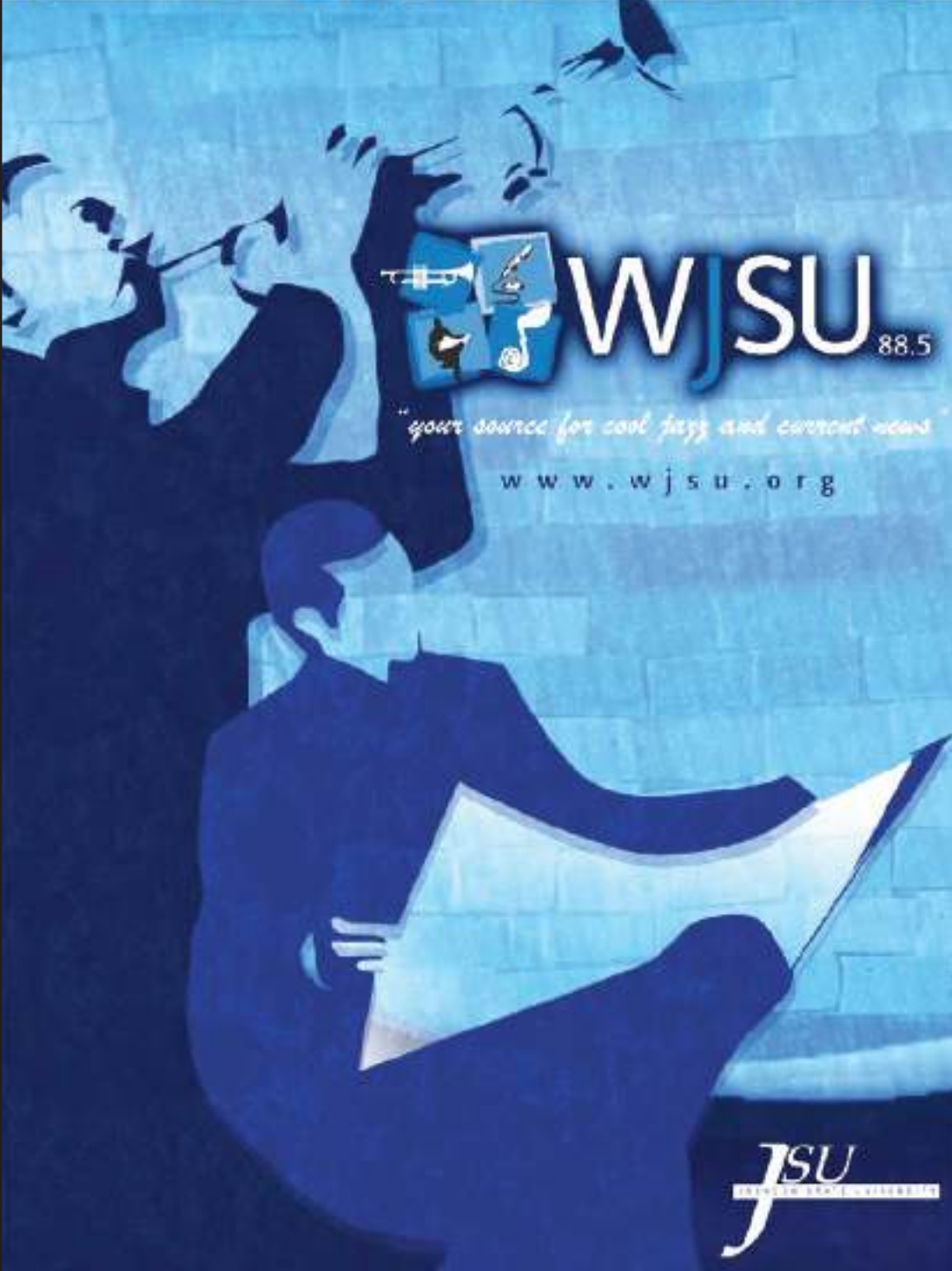
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Jackson State starts season in Nashville with a 26-24 win over Tennessee State

Over 32,000 people packed FirstBank Stadium in Nashville Saturday night for the John A. Merritt Classic. Jackson State versus Tennessee State. Two HBCU programs with plenty of history, plenty of pride, and two fan bases expecting a good football game. They got one. Jackson State escaped Nashville with a 26 to 24 victory, but Tennessee State made them work for every bit of it. Jackson State wasted little time making some noise. Quarterback Jared Lockhart connected with Jabari Jones for an 88 yard touchdown in the first quarter. Crowd goes wild! Jackson State strikes first. On the next drive, Tennessee State answered. Running back Brenton Paul scored on a 9 yard touchdown run to tie the game.

In the second quarter, Tennessee State quarterback Daylin Lee scored on a 1 yard run. Tennessee State would score again. Like a good heavyweight fight, TSU punched back. Daylin Lee led Tennessee State on a long drive that took more than seven minutes off the clock. Lee eventually connected with Francisco Pratts III for a 5 yard touchdown. Tennessee

Seventy-seven yards. More than six minutes off the clock. Tennessee State's defense did a good job keeping JSU out of the end-zone, but Andrew Ivaniciuc came back onto the field. Once again, the freshman delivered. Ivaniciuc nailed a 21 yard field goal with 2:31 left in the game. Jackson State 26. Tennessee State 24.

Daylin Lee and the TSU offense started moving the ball. Lee connected with Jayden Guy for 16 yards and then found Dylan Rodd for 20 more. Tennessee State eventually worked the ball all the way down near the Jackson State goal line. Tiger Nation watching nervously.

Tennessee State fans believed they were about to steal the game. Then everything started going wrong. A delay of game penalty pushed Tennessee State backward.
